if this color is found in the carcass at time of slaughter that carcass will not make Grade A. Often this color is associated with short, thick hogs which frequently make Grade C and suffer a three cent per lb. discount as well as losing \$2.00 premium. On a 150 lb. carcass this total loss is \$6.50.

A thin hog carcass is rarely found in our Maritime packing plants. The most glaring defect is that of over-fatness. If Island swine producers would breed for longer, leaner hogs and feed less fattening ration our level of Grade A hogs could be raised to 80 percent or higher. Even with the breeding stock now on our farms we could have at least 75 percent Grade A hogs if more attention were paid to weights and feeding.

The profit on any phase of farm

production is not so great that even small losses can be suffered as the result of inefficient practices. This makes it very surprising when we find so many hog producers deliberately throwing away dollars by not weighing all pigs before shipment. As a rule, the producer who markets a large number of hogs is the most careful in regard to weights. One producer shipped 141 hogs in one year and had 137 Grade A. Not one hog in this entire output was outside the proper weights.

In one week recently, 122 Island farmers shipped 468 hogs with 183 either too heavy or too light. At the same time, 198 farmers shipped hogs with every one at the proper weights. If the loss on these off-weight hogs were totalled, the amount would indicate that at least one-third of our Island hog producers are throwing away an amount equal to the entire net profit on the hogs involved.

A close study of the above statement of weights, grades, and values should emphasize the fact that the shipping of off-weight hogs is a short road to unprofitable hog production.

Three Tenders For Erection Of Abattoir

HALIFAX (CP) - Agriculture and industrial officials announced Thursday that three tenders have been received for erection of a \$600,000 abattoir on the shores of Bedford Basin here. Tenders close November 29th.

Dr. F.W. Walsh, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, told a press conference the abattoir will give Nova Scotia farmers "a new lease on life."

"We hope for an increased development of the livestock industry here. Last year Nova Scotia imported \$20,000,000 worth of meat in addition to her own production," Mr. Walsh said co-operation between the Federal, Municipal and Provincial Government, plus the Nova Scotia Co-operative Abattoir Limited, and the Halifax Industrial Development Commission, was the keynote of the enterprise.

"Beef can be processed as cheaply in Nova Scotia as anywhere in Canada with the exception of an irrigated pasture in British Columbia. Chairman Avery Duncanson of the Nova Scotia Co-operative Abattoir said.

Eyewitness Says Soviet Tanks Fired On Unarmed Hungarians

BUDAPEST (AP) - Parliament Square in Budapest became a battlefield shortly after noon Thursday when a Russian tank opened fire on a few thousand peaceful demonstrators whose only weapons were Hungarian flags.

Reports from other parts of the capital told similar stories.

The situation was more than confused Thursday morning. It was thought that resistance of the rebels gradually withered away though one could hear sporadic shooting with both small arms and artillery throughout the night.

(This dispatch from the AP correspondent in Budapest was reprinted in some newspapers since Tuesday night.)

It turned out that Wednesday night's shooting was more than a mopping up operation.

At 10 a.m. a crowd of about 2,000 men and women, waving flags and shouting "this is a peaceful demonstration" passed in front of the United States legation to ward the nearby parliament building.

They greeted the American flag, waving from the legation building, with beaming faces. The marchers waved their hats and some shouted: "Why don't you help us?"

Then an amazing thing happened. Two huge Russian tanks and an armored car drove up packed with young Hungarian fraternizing with the Russian soldiers. All were smiling uneasily.

Other tanks and also a number of Russian guns were mounted at various corners of the huge gothic parliament building.

Demonstrators sent a three-member delegation into the building, which houses the prime ministry.

While waiting the return of their delegation, they shouted slogans such as "down with Gerde" and "release our prisoners." (Ernoe Geroe was ousted Thursday as first secretary of the Communist party in Hungary).

FRIENDLY
The Russians remained friendly but kept away from the crowd and prevented demonstrators from reaching a gate leading to the prime ministry.

That possibly something could be done to alleviate this Russian entertainment committee will look into this also.
