PACKING BUTTER FOR EXPORT.

While we have been talking about cold storage, there has been discovered in Australia a simple process by which the inventor claims that they can supersede cold storage, refrigerating plant for land and sea, and despatch butter and similar commodities to every part of the world with the certainty that when opened they will be found in perfect condition.

It is stated that butter packed in Melbourne by the new process has been opened at Kimberley, in South Africa, seven hundred miles from Cape Town, and found to be as good as when it left the butter factory in Victoria.

We have only to add that the greater part of the total deficit in the latter period was due to the Northwest Rebellion, the cost of which was drawn from the revenue.

SEEDS TO SOW

PROFESSOR SANDERS informs us that early in 1891 a series of uniform experiments was planned, to be carried on at all the experimental farms for growing in special plots, side by side on land of uniform character, many different sorts of oats, barley, wheat, peas, corn, mangels, carrots, turnips and potatoes.

The twelve varieties of spring wheat which produced the best results in 1895 at the experimental farm for the Maritime Provinces were:

Table with 2 columns: Name, Per acre Bush. Lbs. Rows include Preston, Stauley, Campbell's White Chief, Heron Bearded, Huron, R. J. Fera, Admiral, Golden Drop, White Conell, Percy, White Russian, Goose.

The six varieties of winter wheat which produced the best results at the Experimental Farm at Nappan in 1895 were:

The six varieties of Indian corn which gave the best crops at the Experimental Farm for the Maritime Provinces in 1895 were:

Every farmer knows, as a matter of course, that the success of his crops depends greatly upon the selection of his seed. We need not, therefore, enlarge upon the importance of the information conveyed to us by the officers of our Experimental Farms.

AN INFLUENTIAL OPINION. Mr. James Fisher, representing Russell, Manitoba, in the Legislature of the Province, is a Liberal in politics and a Presbyterian in religion.

OTTAWA, April 13. Sir Charles Tupper, in moving the adjournment Saturday, said it would, perhaps, be convenient for honorable members to know that when the House meets again on Monday the Government will ask it to again take up the Remedial Bill.
