

Bruins, Rangers And Habs Capture Sunday NHL Wins

BOSTON (AP)—Boston Bruins upset Toronto's National Hockey League playoff hopes today night by edging the Leafs on third period goals by Don Kenney and Doug Mohns. McNamee also contributed another goal in breaking a 12-game personal drought.

The victory before a near-capacity crowd of 13,743 enabled the Bruins to retain their one-point margin over New York Rangers, who defeated Detroit 4-2. Toronto trails New York by seven points in the fight for the final playoff berth.

After a scoreless first period, Toronto's Ron Stewart broke the tie midway through the second session with a backhand for his first goal of the campaign.

Boston defenceman Bob Armstrong then tied the score.
