Miners' Coach Fined \$50.00

HALIFAX, Jan. 6 — (CP) — President J. Elliott Hudson announced Saturday he has fined coach Bud Poile of Glace Bay Miners for conduct "deleterious" to the Maritime Major Hockey League.

The fine was \$50, and Judge Hudson was referring to the game played Dec. 31 between Glace Bay Miners and Charlottetown Islanders. Following is the report of the game submitted by referees Frank Elliott and Blair Peters: "Coach Poile of Glace Bay protested the game at 10:51 of the second period when his club incurred a misconduct penalty after five of his players had left the bench to attempt an altercation with the fans along the aisle to their dressing room. "His club was given an additional penalty for delaying the game by refusing to start play. "Poile threatened to take his team to the dressing room and call the game off but was persuaded to continue play after about 15 minutes delay. There were about 2000 fans in the arena and in the best interests of the league, the Glace Bay club was given extra time to reconsider their thought of returning to the dressing room." Judge Hudson warned that the league would not tolerate any unwarranted delays on the part of coaches with thousands of people in the rink.
