**Gold and Silver in the Northwest.**  
The Prince Albert Times says: Mr.  
Charles Levey, manager of the Northwest  
Mining Company, of Toronto, who has  
been in Prince Albert for the last six weeks  
went east by the last mail. He goes to  
consult the directors of the company on the  
subject of duplicating the machinery which  
now lies at Cumberland, and also of pro-  
curing additional and improved machinery  
for dredging for gold in the Saskatchewan  
River. Mr. Levey intends to return about  
the end of January or beginning of Feb-  
ruary, when he will superintend the build-  
ing of a new charge to receive the machinery.  
Contracts for the timber have been taken,  
to be delivered about the 1st of March.  
The company intend to thoroughly test the  
question of the gold producing qualities of  
our rivers, and we have no doubt that they  
will be successful.  
The Saskiik Herald says: There is some  
likelihood of our being the real estate  
market will, to some extent, be eclipsed by  
the mining boom which has just struck the  
country, although one of the ultimate re-  
sults of the development of mineral wealth  
is sure to be a very great increase in the  
number of real estate transactions. A recent  
exploration in the mining districts of the  
country have been attended with very en-  
couraging results, and mining stocks give  
promise of soon commanding good prices.  
There can be no doubt about the re- being  
immense mineral deposits in this Province,  
extending from Thunder Bay to the Lake of  
the Woods, and now that public attention  
has been drawn to this fact, great discov-  
eries will speedily follow investigations  
on a large scale to be prosecuted next year.  
The region around Lake Winnipeg, as well  
as the islands in that lake, are said to be  
rich in minerals, and as the facilities for  
carrying on operations there are exception-  
ally good we expect to see several mines  
opened in that district during 1883. The  
report that coal has been found at Hamburg  
Bay and at other points on the lake in large  
quantities, if fully verified in the spring,  
will raise public interest in that compar-  
atively little known portion of the Province  
to a high pitch. Of the presence of large  
deposits of iron also there is now no doubt,  
in fact active mining operations have been  
commenced, and would be more vigorously  
pursued but for the scarcity of practical  
miners. In not many years the situation of  
the Province will be quite different from  
what it is at present. The late Act 43, Vic-  
toria, which was passed in the month of  
December last, will be of great service in  
this respect. It provides for the incorpora-  
tion of a Mining Board, which will have  
the honor of examining and reporting on  
all claims for mineral rights, and will also  
have the power of granting licenses to  
miners, and of regulating the mode of  
working the mines. It is to be hoped that  
the Mining Board will be able to do its  
work in a satisfactory manner, and that  
the result will be the discovery of large  
quantities of minerals, and the develop-  
ment of a mining industry, which will  
be of great benefit to the Province.
