## Souris Union Membership Shows Jump

SOURIS — The annual meeting of Souris Credit Union Limited was held in the Credit Union Hall with a good attendance of members and visitors.

The president Elmer Doucette reported on the progress of the credit union for the year with membership of 120 adults and 52 minors, an increase of 60 new members during the year.

The board of directors held 12 monthly meetings. Temporary disability has been added to the share and loan insurance it carries on the members.

The financial statement show-

ed an increase in assets from \$6,375.85 in October 1958 to \$11,008.87 in October 1959 and a turnover of \$15,000. A two per cent dividend to be paid on share capital.

Reports were given by Edward Clinton for the supervisory committee and Paul MacPhee for the credit committee. Mr. MacPhee's report showed that 94 loans were made for a total of \$10,832.50 an average of \$115.45.

New officers elected to the board of directors were Herbert Chaverie and Frank Praught, supervisory committee, Catherine McQuaid and John MacCormack, Credit Committee Frank MacIntosh.

ALBERTON — Directors of the Alberton-Prince County Exhibition Association held their annual banquet in the spacious dining room of the United Church Education Centre in O'Leary on Tuesday night. About 30 directors, their wives, and a number of others connected with the operation of the annual exhibition were served a turkey dinner by Knutsford Women's Institute.

Following the banquet the master of ceremonies, Alton Raynor, introduced several speakers and called on a number of directors to say a few words regarding the future of the exhibition. Harry MacWilliams, chairman of O'Leary Village commissioners, welcomed the directors to their first banquet in O'Leary and briefly outlined some of the advancements made in the incorporated village in the last two years. Among these is an extensive paving program which leaves only one street unpaved, and the installation of a 13,000 foot sewerage system.

At present the commissioners are co-operating with police in an effort to curb traffic violations particularly the problem of teenage drivers.

Lester Wallace, president of the exhibition, commented briefly on his years in office and said he plans to retire next year. A wonderful spirit of co-operation has existed throughout the 33-year history of the Alberton exhibition, he said. In concluding he commended the ladies for the wonderful meal and extended congratulations to the people of O'Leary for their fine church building.

## Ch'town Donors Over Top; S' Side Has Its Turn Today

The green light is now on for Summerside donors. In spite of cold, rainy weather, dedicated donors in Charlottetown turned out full force to fill 1,410 Red Cross bottles with urgently needed, life-saving blood. The desired quota for Charlottetown was 1,300 and during the past three days, people from every walk of life have donated blood at the Community Centre clinics, to exceed this city's quota by 110 or 107 per cent.

The chairman of the Charlottetown clinic committee, Fremont Archer expressed the grateful appreciation of the Red Cross to all donors of this contribution of life-saving blood.

Now one more chapter remains story. Today, the blood donor

to unfold in the Island fall clinic will be set up at the RCAF base in Summerside from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. when the personnel of the station, civilian employees and the families of both, will generously support this last clinic of the year.

From 5 p.m. to 9 o'clock this evening the clinic locale will move to St. Mary's Hall to accommodate the working men and women of Summerside and vicinity; and then tomorrow afternoon and evening Island donors will have their final chance this year to 'save a life!'

Charlottetown contributors, who have gone over the top, will be anxiously watching their neighbors to the west. In past years, a friendly competition has always existed between the communities.

This fall, Mayor E. C. Johnson, feels Mayor W. A. Currie of Summerside will have to pull a number of new donors out of the hat to top Charlottetown's record. This would be an appropriate gesture, since the theme of the Red Cross fall clinic is 'bring a new donor.'

## Highway Toll Rises To 23

Prince Edward Island's highway death toll yesterday rose to 23 this year with the death suddenly this morning of John Walter Cann of Borden, at the P.E.I. Hospital.

Mr. Cann was rushed to the hospital on Tuesday of last week suffering severe injuries received in a head-on collision between two cars on the Meadowbank Road, one-quarter mile from Cornwall.

Mr. Cann's wife, who was in the car with him at the time died shortly after the accident. Both vehicles were practically demolished.

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## Amendment Is Moved In Stolen Goods Case

The case for the Crown was completed in the trial of Donald Joseph Gallant of Summerside in Supreme Court yesterday afternoon and was adjourned until this morning at 10.15 after defence counsel Alex Campbell moved that the indictment be amended in regard to the value of the stolen goods from "more than \$50" to "less than \$50."

Mr. Justice G. J. Tweedy presided with the Attorney-General R.R. Bell, Q.C., and crown prosecutor George E. MacMahon acting for the crown.

The adjournment was made in order to consider the defence motion.

Six crown witnesses gave evidence yesterday including Sgt. T. J. Keefe, in charge of Summerside RCMP detachment; Sgt. E. Courtney, of RCMP detachment, St. John's, Nfld., formerly of the Borden detachment; Harold Phillips, Freeland merchant; Harold Joseph Arsenault, Duvur, a garage operator; Arnold John Arsenault, Duvur, and Cst. Calvin Bungay of the Alberton Detachment, RCMP.

Sgt. Keefe told the court that he was in his office in Summerside on the afternoon of June 30 when he received a call to go to Ross' Corner. When he arrived there he saw a police car in front of which were Cpl. Bigelow and Cst. Courtney along with two men one of whom was the accused.

Sgt. Keefe said he then took Gallant to his office where he was again searched. This time another watch was found in his jacket pocket. When asked where he had obtained the watches the accused replied that he had found them under a building in Summerside the witness said.

The accused later accompanied Sgt. Keefe to the spot where he said he had found the watches and was later placed under arrest. Harold Phillips a merchant from Freeland told the court of losing several watches a hunter's lantern and a small quantity of silverware in a break the night of June 29th. He identified the watches exhibited in court as identical to the ones he had lost in the break.

Harold Arsenault, stated his garage had been broken into on the night of June 29th when 10 cartons of cigarettes, some tobacco, \$30 to \$40 in silver and a watch were stolen. He identified a watch that Cst. Courtney said was taken from the accused, as having been taken from his garage belonging to his brother.

The brother, Arnold Arsenault identified the watch as his, mainly by the two different colors of the strap. He said he had left the watch in the garage the night of June 29th.
