Intensive Search Carried Out For Missing Plane

Planes from Summerside R. O. A. Station yesterday flying in clear, sunny weather completed a full search of both probable and possible areas and failed to find a clue to the disappearance of a small, yellow, single engine Harvard training plane and the two men which have been missing from the Summerside station since it disappeared on Monday afternoon while on a local flying exercise.

A total of 8,704 square miles was searched yesterday making a total of 22,704 square miles that have been searched at least once, but many areas have been searched three or four times since the plane was reported missing.

All of the "probability" and "possibility" areas have not been completely covered. However, officials said that the search will be continued on a reduced scale for an indefinite period.

Reporter Goes Along

To get a first hand account of how the search was conducted a Guardian reporter yesterday accompanied the briefing and flew for three and a half hours on a flight covering one thousand square miles in one of the planes taking part in the search.

This particular plane, a Beechcraft Expeditor, was piloted by Flying Officer G. L. Davis of Lethbridge, Alta., with Flying Officer W. H. Etherington of Stratford, Ont., as co-pilot. Also flying in this aircraft were two members of the Belgian airforce, Sgts. Van Draege and Emile de Konick, who are taking navigational training at the Summerside station.

Their principal task on yesterday's flight was to keep a sharp lookout for anything that might lead to the location of the plane or its two missing crewmembers.

The briefing, which was held at 9:00 a. m., was conducted by searchmaster S-L. J. M. Wicken assisted by P-L T. M. Webster.

They outlined in detail everything that was known regarding the missing plane, including its time of departure from Summerside, its intended exercises and the area in which these exercises would normally have been carried out.

S-L Wicken said that parachutes were carried by both missing air-men but as was customary on local flying over the island, the life belts or dinghy was not included in their safety equipment, because they would normally be over land at all times.

He pointed out to the crews the areas which were covered—showing that the area in which the missing plane might be expected to have been, i.e. the whole island, had been searched no less than five times, as were the surrounding coastal waters.

Possible areas in Cape Breton, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Gulf of St. Lawrence had been received sufficient or partial coverage.

Those areas that had received incomplete coverage chiefly because of poor weather, were the areas visited by the six Expeditors and two Lancasters taking part in yesterday's search.

The crews were briefed on the favorable weather conditions they would find in all areas. S/L Wicken instructed each plane to contact Summerside about 1-2 hour after take-off and within one hour every hour thereafter; and to contact the home base immediately if they observed any promising clues.

Among the clues he said that they should look for, apart from observing the whole plane intact, were bits of wreckage, unusual cuts or swaths in trees, and they should investigate all smoke or fire.

He said lobster fishing buoys in the coastal waters and patches of flowers on the land would resemble the yellow color of the missing plane, but unless sure of what they were, these objects should be investigated. The 8 planes took off at 10 a.m. for their respective areas and other planes took part in the search later in the day to check on reports as soon as received from people in N.B. and P.E.I.

The plane piloted by F/O Davis carried out an extensive search of the land and coastal areas from north of Cape Tormentine, N.B., to south of Oxford, N. S.

Just at the time F/O Davis completed the full search of his area, word was received by radio from the Summerside air station that the R. C. M. P. had reported a man who had been on a bridge over the Harshman River east of Shediac had, on the afternoon of the plane disappeared, seen a single engine aircraft banking to the east with its engine stopped.

As the result of instructions to search the land and coastal water in this area, F/O Davis carried out a search of a wide area bounded by Boutouche, Moncton, Sackville, and Northumberland Strait, before returning to the home base at Summerside.

Over N.S. and N.B. patches of cleared land formed no more than 10 per cent of the land area showing up occasionally through the multi-shades of green covered landscape.

Today, here and there could be seen a farm or an isolated lumber mill, some in operation, some abandoned. Seeing so very many square miles of standing timber would cause one to wonder why there should ever be a housing shortage anywhere in the Maritimes.

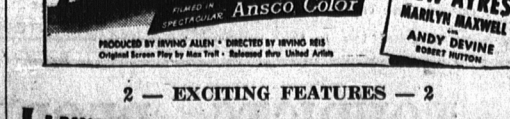
