

# Court Imposes \$200 Fine In Motor Negligence Case

GEORGETOWN — A large docket was before Queens County Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, at Georgetown yesterday. Angus Joseph Campbell, Red Point, pleaded guilty to being criminally negligent in the operation of a motor vehicle and was fined \$200 and costs or two months in jail. The magistrate also ordered that Campbell be prohibited from driving on the highway anywhere in Canada for one year. An order was made for the payment by the accused of \$85.50 to the Receiver General of Canada for damage done to an RCMP vehicle. Campbell was represented by M. J. McQuaid, QC.

In relating the circumstances of the case Corporal Craig of the Souris Detachment of the RCMP and Constable William A. Dewansap, Montague, said the accused had been chased for a total of 22 miles in all at very high speeds, sometimes passing traffic which had to drive on the shoulder of the road. At various times from one to three RCMP cars were in pursuit of the accused's vehicle.

Deputy attorney general J. Arthur McGuigan, QC, represented the Crown in all cases.

Andrew George Leslie, Souris Line Road, represented by M. J. McQuaid, QC, was fined \$100 and costs for impaired driving after his counsel entered a plea of guilty.

Thomas Conway, Souris, represented by Allison Gillis, was charged with selling liquor had his case adjourned to Souris on Jan. 19.

John William MacDonald, Rollo Bay, charged with driving while intoxicated, also represented by Mr. McQuaid, had his case adjourned to Feb. 16, to fix a date for hearing.

Major Ralph Young, Red Point, charged with possession of undersized lobsters and in whose case the evidence had been heard earlier in Souris had the charge against him dismissed. He was represented by M. J. McQuaid, QC.

John Francis Weir, Souris, charged with selling liquor, pleaded guilty and was fined \$200 and costs or three months. He was represented by M. J. McQuaid, QC.

John Alexander MacKinnon, St. Peters, charged with impaired driving had his case adjourned to Souris on Jan. 19.

James Daniel Robbins, Morell, was fined \$10 for illegal parking, and was also fined \$20 and costs for speeding. He was represented by M. J. McQuaid, QC.

Preston Leo Wilson-McMaster, Baldwin's Road, pleaded guilty to fighting at the Canadian Legion Hall in Cardigan and was fined \$20 and costs.

## City Man Found Guilty Of Billiard Parlor Break

Judge C. St. Clair Trainor yesterday in County Court Judge's Criminal Court convicted Francis William Quinn of Charlottetown on a charge of unlawfully breaking into and entering Mr. Cue Billiard Parlor on Kent Street and committing an indictable offense of theft of a large quantity of five, 10 and 25 cent pieces to the total amount of \$43.35, the property of B-Mac Enterprises Ltd. The offence occurred on Dec. 14.

A.K. Scales acted for the Crown, C.R. McQuaid, QC, was counsel for the accused. The accused pleaded not guilty to the charge.

There were four Crown witnesses. They were: Merrill MacLean, part owner of Mr. Cue; Cst. Sydney Hurry, City police; Cst. Roland Diamond, City police and Sgt. Charles Ready, City police.

The money the accused was convicted of taking was said to be stolen from two peanut machines, one cigarette machine and one pin ball machine.

Mr. Scales told the court that this was a serious charge with a maximum penalty of 14 years. He suggested that the accused be sent to Dorchester Penitentiary for two years.

Mr. McQuaid said that the accused was just 17 years old and that he did not feel Dorchester was the place for him.

OFFICIALS MISLED — Judge Trainor said that Commissioner MacLeod had reported that court court officials have been misled into believing that Dorchester had a number of rehabilitation facilities. Judge Trainor said that if Commissioner MacLeod does not have these facilities at Dorchester, he should have. He adjourned the accused to Jan. 20 at 2:30 for sentencing, pending a report by the probation officer. The accused is also awaiting sentence on a conviction of break and entry with intent to commit theft.

Thomas Joseph Larter, City, also charged with break, entry and theft into Mr. Cue was remanded to Jan. 20 at 2:30. Lester O'Donnell, represents the accused. No evidence was heard in his case.

## Local Principal Presents Thesis

Wendell Horton, B.A. M. Ed., principal of Queen Charlotte High School presented his thesis "Scholastic Achievement in the Academic Schools on P.E.I." at a meeting of the Abegweit Chapter of Teachers, Tuesday night at Queen Charlotte High School.

The purpose of the study was to identify pupils in grade seven and trace their progress through to their sophomore year.

Mr. Horton told how the material for his report was gathered. He explained the figures pointing out the grades at which dropouts most frequently occur, the causes for such dropouts and the trouble spots in the educational system.

The members of the college were greatly interested in the findings shown by the research which was carried out. Lt. Col. L. Macdonald voiced his appreciation of Mr. Horton's work and expressed the hope that these statistics will be made available for study.

The business session was taken up by discussion regarding plans for a project to be undertaken by the Canadian College of Teachers.
