

Mighty Bomber Crashes At End Of Test Flight

NDON (CP) — The Vulcan, the world's largest delta-winged bomber, missed the runway and crashed in flames at the end of a test flight Monday at London Airport.

The four-man crew ejected safely, but four others were killed.

The distinguished crowd waiting to see the test flight of the "mighty bomber" home from a test flight to the runway witnessed the crash.

The plane, one of Britain's latest atomic-bomb carriers, burst into a driving rain and fell into the ground while the pilot "talked in" because of bad luck.

The bomber command, led by Air Marshal Sir Harry Broadhurst, and the pilot, Sqdn. Leader Donald Howard, made last-second escapes as their ejector seats hurled them through the roof. They suffered only minor injuries as their parachutes opened to the ground safely.

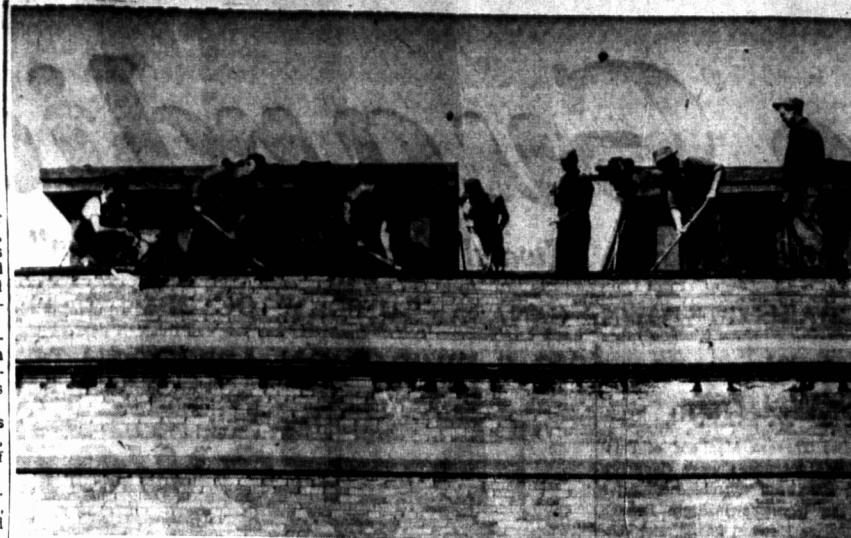
WRECKAGE SCATTERED

A spokesman for the Hawker Siddeley group and A. V. Roe, makers of the Vulcan, said parts of the undercarriage were found in a plowed field several hundred yards in front of the runway outside the airport fence.

This, the spokesman said, indicated the aircraft touched down in advance of the concrete runway and the undercarriage was ripped off.

Broadhurst, 50, was acting as co-pilot to Sqdn. Ldr. Howard, 33, on this proving flight of one of the world's mightiest warplanes.

The four who died were Sqdn. Ldr. Edward J. Eames, 32, James G. W. Stroud, 29, and Albert E. Gamble 35, and Frederick Bassett, 38, a technical expert of A. V. Roe.

B.C. Paper Sold To Thomson Group

KELOWNA, B.C. (CP)—Sale of the Kelowna Courier, a semi-weekly newspaper, to the Thomson newspaper interests was announced Monday by publisher R. P. MacLean.

The Courier, which will become a daily next year, has been acquired by Woodbridge Co. Ltd., a subsidiary of the newspaper interests of Roy H. Thomson.

Kenneth R. Thomson, president of the company and son of Roy H. Thomson, said editorial policies and staff will be unchanged.

The Courier first was published July 28, 1904, by R. H. Spedding. A year later he sold his interests to George C. Rose. Mr. MacLean has been publisher since 1938.

Last week the board of directors of The Canadian Press, in semi-annual meeting in Edmonton, approved the application of the Courier for membership in the name of Mr. MacLean. This brings membership in the national news co-operative to 98.

Reviews Functions of Social Welfare Council

Mr. Walter Baker, Secretary of the Charlottetown Protestant Social Welfare Council was guest speaker at the weekly luncheon meeting of Rotary held at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday. He was introduced by chairman Edwin Johnstone and thanked by co-chairman Tom DeBlois.

Speaking on the subject "Social Work in our present day community" Mr. Baker described it as the art or science of helping people to help themselves in their adjustment to the social problems confronting them. The most commonly used method is casework which calls for private interviews over a period of time in attempts to help the person solve his own problem. In group work guidance is given to the individual. Disturbed persons, aged persons and delinquent persons are helped by this method, and more especially is it effective in dealing with teen-age delinquents.

Mr. Baker spoke of the increasing use of psychiatric social workers in mental hospitals and work with mental health or child guidance clinics. Social workers are now widely employed by federal, provincial and municipal departments to administer programs of municipal relief, family allowances, blind pensions, mother's allowance etc.

The giving of food or financial assistance is now merely a means to an end, that of helping the individual to develop his own capacities to the point where he can become independent, or depending on his own abilities—more independent.

Mr. Baker said that the basic principles in social welfare work is the belief that every individual is worthy of help regardless of the type or extent of their past behaviour. There should be no question of whether a person deserves help, but rather does he need it. Faith that every individual can change and improve is also accepted as a working basis.

In closing, Mr. Baker discussed the functions of the Protestant Welfare Bureau in detail.

Mr. W.E. Fess of Toronto was a guest of Rotary.
