

Kensington Ride Bld. Discusses 64' Project

KENSINGTON — George MacDermid, newly-elected president, chaired the first general meeting of the Kensington Area Board of Trade for the year, held in the old town hall Wednesday evening.

The chief item under discussion was the proposed Kensington Memorial Centre. Lloyd Lockery gave a comprehensive report on a proposal as outlined by a Lions Club meeting at a special meeting held in the Kensington Regional High School.

Mr. Lockery gave the general idea of the proposed building at the cost of approximately \$80,000, and said that the Lions Club hopes to obtain a substantial grant through ARDA. The balance of the cost would be borne by the people of the Kensington area.

Mr. Lockery gave a number of ideas suggested by the Lions Club to be carried out at a centennial festival on July 10, 11 and 12 of 1964. The festival would include dances, mammoth supper and dinners, and a general turning at 2 p.m.

There will be no large influx of out-of-province speakers for the Conservative party campaign in the province, speakers committee chairman Bennett said yesterday, noting that there were already two "able" speakers here in Fisherman's Bay.

THE FIRST stages of the random sample test commenced yesterday at Burn's hatchery, Summerside, where new-born chicks were created for the trip to Ralph Royner's hatchery at Mount Herbert.

Large Scale Poultry Tests Are Underway

Importing room for five months at Mr. Royner's hatchery. On Aug. 17, 110 birds from each of two strains of 55 each, will be entered in production tests and will remain on these tests for 500 days.

Complete records are kept throughout all phases of the chick's growth, with emphasis placed on the profit per-hatched-out.

The newly-hatched pullets will be raised in a common brooding room where every effort is made to handle all pullets uniformly so that they receive the same ration at the same time daily and all other aspects of the test are the same for each chick.
