Chronology Of Session

OTTAWA (CP)—Chronology of the 248-day 1964-65 session of Parliament which opened Feb. 18, 1964, and ended April 2, 1965.
Feb. 21—1964
Feb. 21—First non-confidence motion rejected, 134 to 87.
March 3—Initial 1964-65 spending program of \$7,585,513, 408 introduced.
March 13—Dispatch of 1,150 Canadian troops to UN Cyprus force approved.
March 16—Budget contains no major tax changes.
March 17—Canada Pension Plan introduced.
April 20—New tax-sharing formula gives provinces extra \$60,000,000 in 1964-65. New Canada Pension Plan devised.
April 22—MPs Gerard Giguere and Gerard Ouellet quit Social Credit party and joined Conservatives.
May 26—Government proposes three-leaf flag.
June 5—Columbia River treaty approved.
June 19—Alvin Hamilton PC—Qu-Appelle expelled for day over refusal to withdraw charge that Prime Minister Pearson misled the House on controversial TV film about the prime minister.
June 29—E. J. Benson (L-Kings) appointed revenue minister.
July 7—Youth allowances legislation passed.

July 9—12-mile fishing limit established.
July 24—Interest-free bank loans for university students approved.
Sept. 10—Committee established to seek flag compromise.
Oct. 29—Flag committee recommends single red maple leaf flag.
Nov. 9—Canada Pension Plan revised again.
Nov. 16—Redistribution bill passed.
Nov. 18—Canada Pension Plan bill gets second reading.
Nov. 22—Erik Nielsen (PC—Yukon) alleges attempted bribery and coercion by ministerial aides in Lucien Rivard case.
Nov. 24—Guy Rouleau (L-Montreal) resigns as parliamentary secretary to prime minister, saying he was questioned in Rivard case.
Nov. 26—Dorion judicial inquiry set up to investigate Mr. Nielsen's charges.
Dec. 15—Commons approves flag design, 163 to 78.
Dec. 18—Session recesses for Christmas, 1965.
Feb. 16—Session resumes day after new flag raised. Prime Minister Pearson informs Commons of Jan. 22 resignation of Yvon Dupuis as minister without portfolio.
Feb. 18—Remi Paul (Berthier—Maskinge—Delanau) leaves Conservative ranks to sit as an independent.
Feb. 22—National labor code approved.
March 3—Commons spends day in emergency debate on

Lucien Rivard's March 2 escape from Montreal's Boreaux Jail.
March 22—Initial 1965-66 spending program of \$8,304,727,432 introduced.
March 29—Canada Pension Plan passes Commons 159 to 12.
March 30—Commons adopts formula permitting provinces to opt out of federal-provincial shared-cost programs.
April 2—Session prorogued.

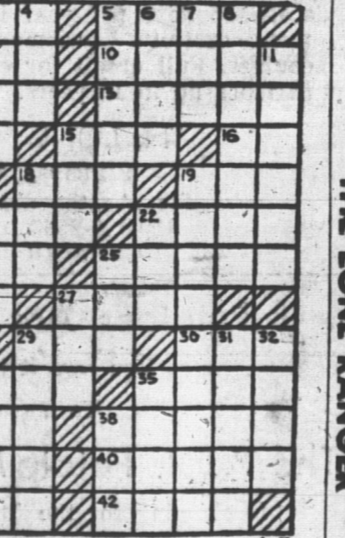

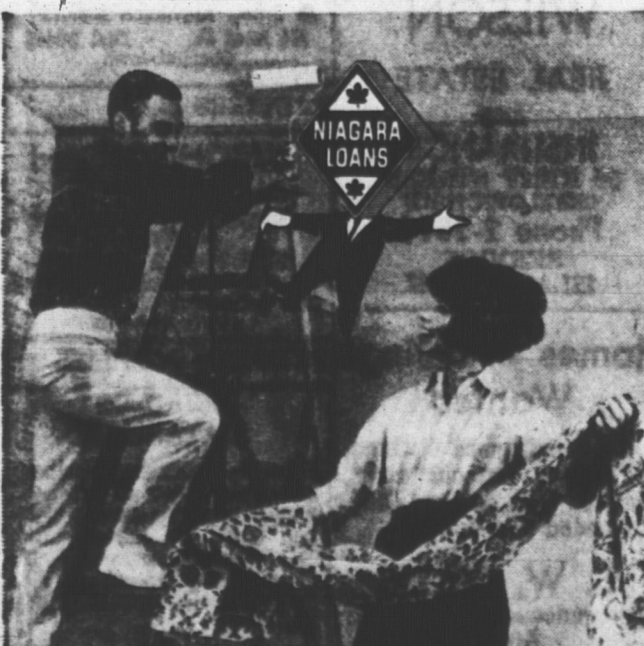
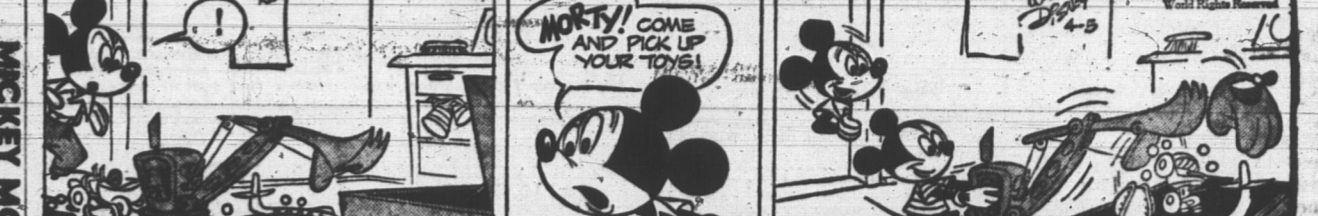
