I. O. G. T.—Ch'town Lodge No. 1, meets tonight at 8 o'clock sharp. A full attendance requested.

Hon. G. W. Burbridge, Judge of the Exchequer Court of Canada, is in the city. During his stay he will be the guest of the Master of the Rolls.

Mr. G. D. Balderson, of North Wilshire, P. F. I., arrived here this morning. He is a well-to-do farmer, who will probably settle here.—Regina Standard, May 13th.

We regret to learn that Mr. Alex. McLeod, master of the barque Ralph B. Peake, was so ill with rheumatic fever on the way out from the Old Country that he was, on his arrival in this port, immediately removed to the Charlottetown Hospital to undergo medical treatment and care.

FROM HALIFAX.—The steamer Fastnet, Captain Hopkins, arrived from Halifax via intermediate ports at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning, with a general cargo and three passengers, Capt. McGrath, F. Palmer and M. Rice. She left for Summerside at noon, and is expected to return to Ch'town at 6 this morning. She will leave here on Monday for Halifax about 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

This body of the dead child found by keeper Gregory in the Peoples' Cemetery, on Tuesday evening, was identified on Wednesday morning by Dr. Jenkins as that of a still-born infant of Mary De Courcy. The body, when found, was in a small box, attired in a white dress. The box was slightly buried, the top being on a level with the sod. A jury was empanelled; but when the coroner and jury arrived upon the scene they considered it unnecessary to hold an inquest, under the circumstances, and the body was decently interred.

MANTOBA is having a great boom this season, some 18000 emigrants having gone there already. The attention of the home seekers all over the world is now turned to that country. It is expected that fully 40000 people from the United States will settle in the West this year, there being quite a flow of emigration from Dakota, Michigan and Maine. The energetic policy of the C. P. R. in bearing fruit, seeding in Manitoba is pretty well done, as the wheat here, with the exception of one severe snow storm, has been very fine.

NOTWITHSTANDING the promises of an early spring the weather has been very backward all over the maritime provinces. A traveller reports that in the Annapolis Valley the season is about three weeks later than usual. From the same source, we learn that Nova Scotia apples are of very good price this spring, good stock bringing as much as five dollars per barrel for the English market, where most of the apples from there are shipped. A Mr. Miller, of Middleton, N. S., cleared \$2000 from ten acres of fruit last year. There is no reason why the P. E. Island farmers should not devote more attention to apple growing, as apples can be grown on this Island as well as anywhere, if they received the proper care and attention.

MARRIAGE TIES.—Mr. James Arbing, our popular tanner, was married today at Bonaventure to Miss Henderson, widow of the late Donald McFadyen, and young daughter of Archibald Henderson, of above place. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Mr. Davison, of North River. The happy couple arrived home at 10.30 p. m., where a goodly number of friends were waiting to extend congratulations. We wish Mr. and Mrs. Arbing many years of health and happiness.

Rev. Mr. Goodwill held a service in Brien's Hall, Victoria, on Monday night, which was largely attended. We hear it is intended to continue the services.—Crapaud, May 17.

NORTH ATLANTIC LINE.—The Worcester, of the North Atlantic Company's line, arrived here on Wednesday morning from Boston. She is commanded by Captain Brown, formerly of the Carroll. The other officers are John Ives, 1st mate; L. M. Crowell, 2nd do; Mr. Thornton, engineer; J. A. Briggs, pilot; John Walsh, steward; M. A. Manley, 2nd do; Mrs. McQuaid, stewardess. W. P. Nickerson, we are pleased to note, fills the position of purser. He is always a favorite with our people. The Worcester has undergone considerable improvements and is now fitted up in first-class condition for either passenger or freight traffic. Her passengers to this port were: Messrs J. H. McLeod, H. H. Shaw, D. Willis, Miss Morrow, Miss Lewis and Miss Livingstone. Among her freight were 4,000 barrels of flour.

ISLANDS ABOARD.—A Boston paper says:—At the afternoon session of the divorce court, before Judge Fossenden, yesterday, Annie Livingstone, a tall, handsome woman, sought a separation from Alexander Livingstone, whom she wedded in 1881, at Charlottetown. Shortly afterward they went to Boston. Alexander, it was alleged, soon became tired and shiftless, and spent most of his time hanging about liquor saloons. His wife found employment in a store, and by sitting up late at night, managed to keep the household bills squared up. This went on for six months, during which time Alexander cruelly persecuted his wife. He came home one evening and kicked over the supper table, smashing the dishes and scattering the food purchased by the toil of his wife. At one time he loaded up a revolver in the presence of Mrs. Livingstone, saying he was going to blow a hole through her. In consequence of these cruelties she was greatly weakened in strength and decided to live by herself. Judge Fossenden relieved the libellant of the yoke she had so long borne.

Rev. W. B. King informed a reporter that all arrangements had been completed for his appointment to Christ Church, Cambridge, Mass. He enters upon his new duties the 1st of September next.
