late King to continue in office. A third proclamation, declaring a national day of mourning, will be issued when the date of the King's funeral is known.

The Proclamation The proclamation declaring Elizabeth's accession to the throne said, in part: "... the high and mighty Princess Elizabeth Alexandra Mary is now by the death of our late Sovereign of happy and glorious memory become our only lawful and rightful Liege Lady Elizabeth the Second by the grace of God, of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the seas Queen, Defender of the Faith, Supreme Liege Lady in and over Canada."
