Former Alberton Resident Wins Photographic Awards

ALBERTON — A former Alberton boy, Lorne Pridham, now a well-known Saint John photographer, has won the trophy for the best pictorial photograph in the 1963 competition among Canada's professional photographers. Last month he flew to London, Ont., where the trophy was presented during the annual meeting of the Professional Photographers of Canada Inc.

Mr. Pridham became the first photographer in the 14-year history of the John E. McCulloch pictorial trophy to win it for a second time. He held it for the first time in 1960. This year professional photographers from across the country entered 80 prints in the various competitions, of which the pictorial division had the largest number of entries.

This was the second major award won by Mr. Pridham during the month of May. He also won the Assoc. of Canada trophy for the best commercial photograph at the annual show of the Maritime Photographers Association in Kentville, N.S. It was the sixth time he had won this award in the last eight years.

Mr. Pridham, manager of the Saint John branch of Harvey Studios Ltd., has been winning regional and national professional photographic competitions regularly since he first began entering them 10 years ago.

He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Percy Pridham and has many relatives and friends in the western part of this province.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says only a few clouds were reported in the skies over the Maritimes late Wednesday evening. However, cloud associated with a disturbance over the Great Lakes was lurking on the northern border of New Brunswick. This cloud and scattered showers will slip slowly southward, reaching Prince Edward Island and southern New Brunswick late in the day. Temperatures in these provinces will be

a little cooler, particularly in northern New Brunswick. In Nova Scotia today's weather will be very similar to that of Wednesday with the exception of cooler temperatures along the Atlantic as sea breezes develop. Regional forecasts: Nova Scotia — Sunny becoming cloudy in the evening; continuing warm except cooler along the coast; light winds increasing in the afternoon to southwest. Low-high at Halifax 46 and 70, Yarmouth 46 and 70, Sydney 46 and 70, Kentville 46 and 70, Sydney 45 and 75. Prince Edward Island, Eastern N.B. Counties, Lower St. John River Valley: Clear, becoming cloudy with a few showers this afternoon; little change in temperature; light winds increasing in the afternoon to southerly 20. Low-high at Charlottetown 40 and 70, Moncton 50 and 73, Fredericton 50 and 75, Saint John 45 and 70.

FIRST ESKIMOS VISIT ALBERTON

The first Eskimos to visit Prince Edward Island, Adam Adams, 20 (center) and David Pingaravak, 18 of Payne Bay in the Ungava region of northern Quebec (right) are pictured above on board 46-foot longliner "Glaugauk" at Alberton wharf. Constructed by Alberton Industries boat-building firm, the two longliners plan to

leave Alberton Sunday on a 2,600 mile cruise to their home ports in the far north. This will also be the first time that boats have left Alberton en route to Hudson Bay. Charles Russell, technical officer with the department of northern affairs (left) will be in charge on the long cruise which is expected to take close to a month. Supplies of all kinds are being loaded and marine radios are being installed.

Both boats are equipped with sails in the event of an engine failure and both carry dories. A third Eskimo Singitak, a veteran boatman, will join the party Friday along with Don Milligan of the northern affairs department. A christening ceremony is planned for Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock and most members of the provincial cabinet are expected to be present. The ceremony is to be televised for later showing.

Two men were fined \$20 and costs each for possession of liquor in a place other than their residence.

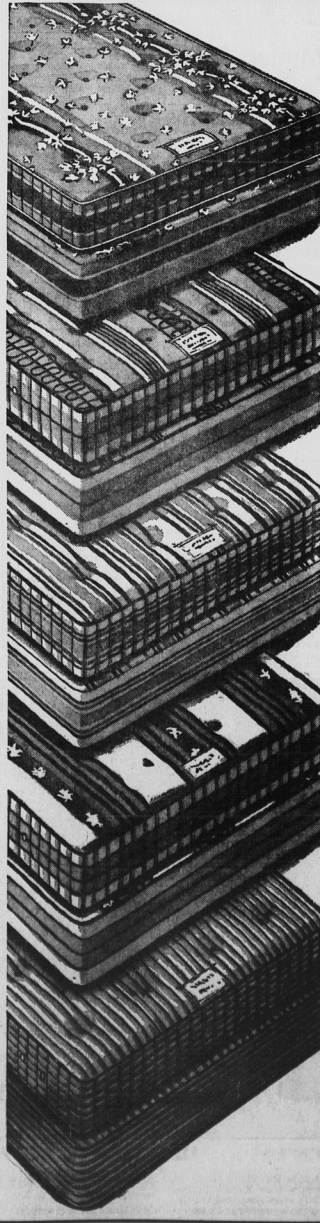
