(Continued from page 1) the quality of those bombers, and that in a few years they will have a supersonic rather than a subsonic bomber force.

"This means that we must not only maintain the defences

against bomber attack which we have today, but we must also improve those defences so we can counteract a supersonic attacking force."

A Canadian government white paper on defence published Thursday says: "It now is considered that the threat of the manned bomber is not as great as was originally anticipated." Thus production of the Arrow had not been considered justified.

P.E.I. Said Only Province With Full 'A.I. Coverage'

About 65,000 cows in the Miramichi last year were bred by means of artificial insemination, and about 9,000 of these were on P.E.I. The East Prince Artificial Breeding Club were told by Dr. D.G. Moore, manager of the N. B. Central Artificial Breeding Co. of Fredericton, New Brunswick, guest speaker at the annual meeting of the East Prince Club, attended by some 75 breeders at their annual banquet meeting in Summerside last night.

Dr. Moore told the meeting that P.E.I. has the distinction of being the only province in Canada with complete coverage of A.I. Breeding available to all its farmers, and the co-operative arrangement between N.B. and P.E.I. has enabled the Fredericton battery to carry more breeds than any other in Canada. He reminded the breeders that the subsidized assistance provided by the provincial government has placed the opportunity before the breeders of choosing from a splendid variety of sires.

P.E.I. IS 'BEST IN CANADA'

Swine Breeders Challenged To Maintain National Position

A challenge to maintain the high efficiency rating achieved by the Yorkshire breed was given members of the Prince Edward Island Swinebreeders' Association, who met for their annual meeting in Charlottetown yesterday afternoon.

The challenge came from senior livestock fieldman, Harold W. Clay who for 37 years has been with the cooperation of Island breeders, developing the breeding policy of Island hogs and has brought it to a position where the province enjoys the highest percentage of grade A hogs in Canada, almost 90 per cent.

TO RETIRE

Mr. Clay told the meeting that this would be the last occasion on which he expected to address

them in his official capacity. He intends to retire from his position this fall.

The veteran authority on swine breeding, said he was sorry that he had to disassociate himself with the industry in this particular year. He predicted a difficult season for hog raising and he hoped that there would be no relaxation in effort to maintain the advanced registry testing which has been such a big factor in raising Island standards.

DROP OUTS EXPECTED

He predicted that the lowering of the ceiling on pork prices would have the effect of seeing a number of producers go out of business. He warned the breeders that his inevitable slump might not have the effect on the larger producer than many expected.

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PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND LAMB PRODUCERS

Last year our Association passed a resolution requiring buck lambs to be discounted \$1.00 per head and lambs with long tails 50c per head. These regulations will be in effect again this year beginning August 1, 1959.

The quality of P.E.I. lambs marketed in 1958 showed a very marked improvement. It is our opinion that the above regulations were responsible for some of this improvement.

The following live grades and weights will be in effect for marketing lambs beginning August 1st, 1959:

Good lambs 85-110 lbs. produce the most desirable carcasses. All other grades and weights will be discounted.

NOTE: BUCK LAMBS WILL BE DISCOUNTED \$1.00 PER HEAD. ALL LAMBS WITH LONG TAILS WILL BE DISCOUNTED 50 CENTS PER HEAD. THIS ALSO APPLIES TO RAIL GRADE.

The above recommendations have been presented to the principal lamb buyers on Prince Edward Island and have been approved by them.

- We strongly urge all lamb producers to:
1. Castrate all buck lambs intended for market.
 2. Dock all lambs.
 3. Provide for supplementary pasture this fall to finish lambs after weaning.
 4. Market lambs at proper weights; that is, 85 to 110 pounds.
- We recommend Rail Grading of all market lambs.
