LATEST NEWS FROM INDIA!

MERCHANTS' EXCHANGE, October 13.

The American Steamer Atlantic arrived at New York; English dates to 30th of September. News from India two weeks later. Delhi dates to 12th August. The place was still held by the mutineers. European reinforcements were arriving. A general assault was expected to be made on the 20th. General Havelock, after severe fighting, had reached Lucknow, but in consequence of inadequacy of force, retired to Cawnpore. The Garrison at Lucknow and Agra were reported as still holding the places, but precariously situated. Admiral Seymour has declared Canton under blockade.

The monetary crisis in the United States has affected Halifax somewhat. Capital is in great demand there, and mercantile stock is pressed into market to raise money. Some parties here, as might be expected, take advantage of the existing state of affairs, and draw money from local institutions, to use in speculation. Consequent on these and other movements, the Banks greatly limit, or stop, discounting, and scarcity of money and difficulty accordingly is experienced. One result, of painful character, is that several persons engaged in the Labrador fishery find themselves at the market and with cargoes, but without sales,—or without sales except at a disastrously low price. This, subsequent to the tolls, and risks of a voyage,—and then subsequent to the catch and hopes of remunerating returns,—affords subject for regret and sympathy.—Halifax Sun.

The selection of Montreal as the Capital of Canada has been announced.

Flour was selling in Indiana for four dollars and a half per barrel. For a first time within five years. The article was quoted at Troy, N. Y., below \$5.

The Vanderbilt is expected to bring 2,500,000 francs, above £100,000 on her next homeward trip; a welcome contribution in dull times.

New York, Sept. 24.—Oats were very freely offered at much reduced quotations, yet they were highly dealt in. Advices from the principal markets of the interior report heavy arrivals and limited sales of Oats—prices generally leaning in favor of purchasers. Rye and Barley were plentier and cheaper, with a moderate inquiry for each.

STEAMER IN THE GULF.—We understand the Government of Canada have appointed the handsome sum of £5000 annually, towards supporting a steamer to ply between Quebec, Gaspe and Shediac. We hope this will be the means of inducing the Legislature of this Province to act in a like liberal spirit, to open up a communication by steam, between the Ports on the Gulf Shore. We trust the inhabitants of Kent, Northumberland, Gloucester and Restigouche, will not neglect to urge this important subject on their consideration. It will not do for us to remain stationary while all our neighbours are progressing onwards in the march of improvement.—Miramichi Gleaner.

MISS MACMURRAY'S DRAWING ACADEMY.—We were very much gratified, the other morning, in paying a visit to this young lady's Academy, and examining not only her own specimens, but also the works of her different pupils. 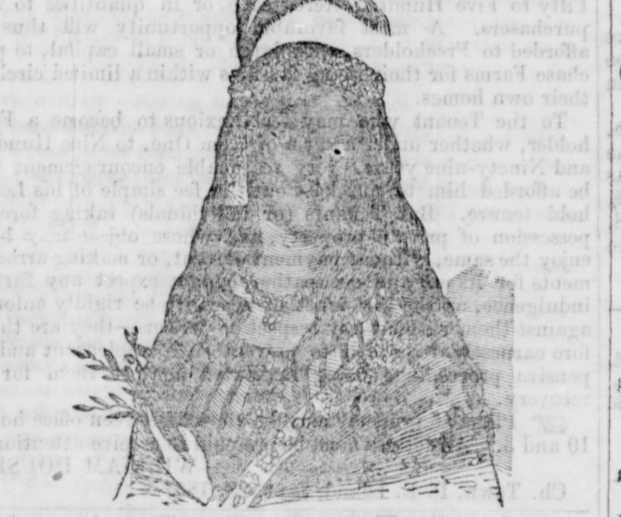
