

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 21. The Turkish Commander at Brumou informed the inhabitants that the Russians will enter the city Aug. 27. The Municipal Government has announced that vessels will arrive to embark any inhabitants who do not wish to remain.

NEW YORK, Aug. 21. William Niblo, a veteran theatrical manager and founder of Niblo's Garden, in this city, died to-day, aged 89.

Bogardus, who arrived here last night, accepts Dr. Carver's challenge to shoot eight hours. He offers to put up \$1,000 forfeit to-day if the match is made for \$5,000 a side.

In a prize fight at Harlem, last night, Jack Sullivan, of this city, whipped Bob Brown, of Baltimore. Both were badly mutilated.

BOSTON, Aug. 21. The mortality at the South from yellow fever continues to increase.

In New Orleans, yesterday 136 new cases were reported, and 41 deaths.

There are nearly 300 cases at Vicksburg, Miss., and a panic prevails at Jackson, although no deaths have yet occurred. At Grenada 70 deaths are already recorded, and the contagion is still spreading.

VIENNA, Aug. 21. The Porte has received an official telegram stating that the Russians have summoned the Lazis to immediately evacuate Batoum, but the Lazis have refused.

The Russian General Staletoff has organized an army of 75,000 Bulgarian volunteers, to whom the Czar has furnished arms and officers.

Some Austrian companies have been reduced from 240 to 80 men.

HAVRE, Aug. 21. Queen Christiana of Spain is worse, and no hope is entertained of her recovery.

VIENNA, Aug. 21. The approach of a train bearing 600 Turkish prisoners is signalled.

LONDON, Aug. 21. A dispatch to the Times from Rome says:—"Although the Italian Indemity party has been disowned as not being the representative voice of the country, and though the utter absurdity of provoking a conflict with Austria has been fully confessed, the idea still exists in the minds of all Italy, and finds expression even in the most moderate journals, that a national geographical and ethnographical unity of Italy is incomplete."
