Atlantic Ocean. He said the nationality of such a commander was secondary, although before he became Prime Minister he protested because the job was due to go to an American, Admiral William Fechteler.

Refuses to Merge Troops Churchill refused to merge British troops in the French-sponsored project for a unified European army, though Britain agrees "there should be a European army and that Germany must take an honorable place in it." He said Britons would take their place beside such a European army. On atomic research, Churchill said that when he came into office as Prime Minister six weeks ago he found much work had been done. He said this work was "not only on making the crucial materials required for the atomic bomb but in preparing to manufacture the weapon." He indicated A-bomb development would be one of the things he will discuss with President Truman in Washington next month.

general revenue application. Ian Sinclair, Canadian Pacific Railway counsel, said the freight rates from New Brunswick to Toronto on potatoes were lower than those from Maine. He also said that in the last two months the increases in potato prices in Montreal and Toronto were, respectively, 91 and 89.5 per cent. Commissioner Howard B. Chase suggested to the potato witnesses that they should get together with the railways and discuss the question of tolls on potatoes. He felt that would be preferable to formal objections in rate hearings. For the Newfoundland Board of Trade and the Associated Newfoundland Industries, board president Edgar Miller said in a brief that Newfoundland's relatively great distance from Canada's chief markets emphasizes the need for transportation at the lowest possible cost. But since confederation in 1949, he said, the railways' percentage rate increases had borne down more heavily on Newfoundland than on the central part of Canada. There should be a "compression" rather than an extension of Newfoundland's isolation from the rest of Canada.

carried across the Northumberland Strait on the two ferry systems. It made a total of 11,109 cars brought here exclusively of cars bearing Island licenses. The two other countries represented were Hawaii and Mexico. The Travel Bureau estimates that the total number of visitors to Prince Edward Island for the first 11 months of this year is approximately 110,000. The Bureau had 8,449 inquiries for information and literature, with 1,480 of the writers expressing their intention of spending their holidays here. Of the number who did spend vacations in this Province 6,018 registered at the Bureau and the fact that the large number took the trouble of writing to the Bureau on their return to express appreciation of the beauty of the Island and the courtesy shown them. The Bureau this year sent out approximately 250,000 booklets and tourist maps. Some of these went to non-resident hunters of whom there were 170 registered here for the shooting seasons. Some of the credit for the increased advertising done by the Bureau and the fact that the number of travel agencies and bureaux in other centres now handling Prince Edward Island tourist traffic has increased from the former 140 to 486.
