Royal Journey Picture Shown

"Royal Journey", the National Film Board's official film record of the recent tour across Canada of their Royal Highnesses the Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh, was premiered in the capital cities of Canadian Provinces last evening.

Charlottetown's showing took place at the Prince Edward Theatre in the late evening before a distinguished gathering of civic and Provincial officials, clergy, guests, and was under the patronage of His Honour the Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. T. W. L. Prowse.

The film was introduced by Mr. Bramwell Chandler, Director of Adult Education for Prince Edward Island, who announced the film would be released next month and would no doubt be shown to the public of this Province before the end of January.

Lasting a little more than an hour, the record of the tour is in a new colour process which makes each scene a thing of great beauty. From the landing of the plane bearing the Royal visitors to Canada, through the 30-day panorama of Canadian scenery, the film gives glimpses of their Highnesses at every stop they made.

The excellence of the photography, coupled with the new colour and touches of human interest which lift the film out of the usual realm of this type of pictorial record, make the film one of unforgettable beauty.

Flying all the way from Korea to Charlottetown, Major Andrew B. MacRae, Winsloe, (above) arrived at his home on Thursday to spend thirty days' leave.

Major MacRae left Seoul for Kure, Japan, on Dec. 11th on the first leg of the journey, and then continued by Canadian Pacific Airways from Tokyo to Vancouver, with a one hour stop at Shemya, Aleutian Islands.

As Officer Commanding, Headquarters Company, 2nd Battalion, Royal Canadian Regiment, Major MacRae has served two periods of service in Korea. He was promoted to Major at Fort Lewis, Washington, when he was with the Advanced Party of the Special Canadian Force.

Christmas mail for the Canadian troops had just started to arrive before his departure, he said, and with the plans to serve the usual Christmas dinner with all the trimmings, the Yuletide holiday will be as enjoyable as possible under the circumstances.

As is the case wherever Canadian troops are stationed, the children of Seoul are no exception. Major MacRae said that they are sponsoring an orphanage of three hundred waifs in Seoul and are going all out in their efforts to give them a good time at Christmas.

A coincidence of Major MacRae's service in Korea is that his superior officer, Col. R. A. Keane, D.S.O. was also his superior of-

ficer in Europe when he served Major MacRae said it was doubtful if he would be returning to Korea after his leave expires.
