Pearson Paints

Mr. Low said freedom-loving rational groups behind the Iron Curtain could become one of the most important factors in bringing about the downfall of the Soviet dictatorship.
He contended that the West has been "too ready" to grant concessions to Russia. Western leaders had allowed their advisory council to become "packed with unfaithful servants who have been guilty of perjury on some occasions." He did not elaborate on this point.

Too Many Concessions

Mr. Pearson said there must be no compromise with Communist military aggression in Asia or anywhere else. But it must not be assumed that all moves in Asia are Communist-inspired.
Attempts must be made to convince Asians that democracy can do more for the individual than communism.

Germany

Mr. Pearson said not too much should be expected from the Berlin conference of foreign ministers.
He acknowledged that some people are "disturbed" about the economic recovery of West Germany. "But surely it is not realistic to base any permanent policy on the disarmament, the control and neutralization of 65,000,000 Germans inside their present boundaries."

Newsprint Output At Record High

MONTREAL, (CP) - Canadian production of newsprint in 1953 reached a new record high for the 10th straight year, R. M. Fowler, president of the Canadian Pulp Paper Association, said Thursday night in his annual report.
Total output was 5,700,000 tons, an increase of one half per cent over 1952 while exports both of newsprint and pulp were also slightly higher.
