

Liberal Potato Resolution Scores Inaction By Gov't

A strongly worded resolution expressing "resentment at the delay in action of the Federal Government" in connection with representations made to it for tariff protection against American potato imports, was passed unanimously at the annual meeting of the West Prince Liberal Association on Monday night. The resolution, which was moved by Fred C. Ramsay, M. L. A. and seconded by Arnold Wood, urged that there be "no further delay" in implementing the demands of Canadian potato growers.

Present at Lester Wallace, Casamper, presided at the meeting which was held in the public hall at O'Leary. The secretary was Leigh Hodgson, of Alberton.

Nominations for officers resulted in the re-election of the president and secretary and the following to the executive:

First district: Alvin Palmer, Harris Callaghan, Joseph E. Gallant, Russell Stewart.

Second district: Arnold Wood, Harris Rogers, James MacLean and Carman MacNeill.

A motion was approved extending a warm welcome to Senator Fred Inman of Montague, the first woman Senator from Prince Edward Island and the first to attend a West Prince Liberal meeting.

Senator Inman addressed the meeting on the political implications of women in politics and offered to help organize the ladies of the district in the interests of the Liberal Party.

Premier A. W. Matheson spoke on general topics followed by Senator George Barbour, who stated that it was his 21st attendance at annual meetings of this particular association.

Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M. P., in his address referred to the federal affairs, the pipe line debate and to the serious implications the seizure of the Suez canal might have on the cold war.

Other speakers were Messrs. F. C. Ramsay, M. L. A.; Prosper Arsenault, L. A.; Charles McKay and Hon. J. A. Bernard. Resolutions were passed expressing confidence in the federal and provincial leaders.

POTATO RESOLUTION

Following is the text of the potato resolution:

"Whereas the growing of potatoes by the farmers of the maritime provinces is what the growing of wheat is to the Western farmers, a cash crop, and whereas the wheat farmers of the west are assured of stability in the price of wheat due to international agreements which are sponsored by government controlled agencies while on the contrary the price of potatoes to the grower is governed by the law of supply and demand.

"And whereas there is no tariff protection from the importation of potatoes from other countries especially the United States, which has led in past years to the grower receiving ruinous prices which effects the entire economy of the province; and in order that some stability in prices to the grower might be brought about representations were made to the Federal Government by grower and dealer organizations by the Horticultural Council of Canada and by the Canadian Federation of Agriculture which received the unanimous support of all parties in the governments of the Maritime Provinces and by all provinces in Canada where potatoes are grown commercially. That a countervailing tariff on duty be levied on the importation of potatoes from the United States.

"And whereas the Federal Government during the past session of the House of Commons has passed legislation authorizing the federal treasury to pay out of treasury funds the storage charges on Western held grain in order that the Western wheat grower shall receive higher net returns which in effect means that the potato grower will thereby help pay for this large commitment.

"And whereas, the Federal Government has at the request of Canadian magazine publishers levied a duty on U. S. publications in order that Canadian publishers receive protection.

"And whereas certain statements have appeared in the Canadian Press which have been attributed to the Hon. Mr. Harris, minister of Finance regarding this question which are not in accordance with the facts as presented to him by the aforementioned organizations.

"Therefore be it resolved that the West Prince Liberal Association at this their annual meeting register in no uncertain terms their resentment at the delaying action of the Federal Government on representations that were made to it regarding this important question and that there be no further delay in the implementation of their just demands."

On motion this resolution was referred to Mr. J. Watson MacNaught M. P., to be presented to the proper authorities.

Expects Federal Contest In June

"There will be a federal election probably in June, providing the international situation does not prevent it," stated Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, member of parliament for Prince and parliamentary assistant to the minister of fisheries at Ottawa, in addressing the annual meeting of the West Prince Liberal Association at O'Leary on Monday night.

Speaking of fisheries, Mr. MacNaught said he was profoundly pleased that the catch was so good. When he suggested, three years ago, the policy of the fisheries department would bring about a 25 per cent increase in the catch some doubt was expressed. Most of our fishermen are now impressed with the policy of throwing back the small lobsters," he said. In the Department of fisheries we are doing our utmost to provide adequate facilities for fishing areas. I am pleased that the Cape Wolfe project is going forward and no doubt the anchorage and facilities will be increased as time goes on."

Mr. MacNaught explained the new policy of the R.C.M.P. with regard to separate quarters, which resulted in the federal ulding in O'Leary being reduced to a post office, two agricultural offices and one office for fisheries. "However the people of O'Leary will have a federal building in which they will have justifiable pride," he said.

Town Manager Guest Speaker At S'Side Rotary

Mr. Joseph A. Brophy, newly appointed town manager for the town of Summerside was the guest speaker at the regular meeting held at Mulberry Lodge. He had as his topic "Town management," and outlined the old system. Men who were trained in their own businesses had to take duties entirely foreign to them. This resulted in many cases in sloppy governments and inefficiency.

While Probably the System Worked in Former Years, When the Duties of these Officials were Not Heavy, it is Different Today Where Town Business is Big Business.

Recognition of this fact is given by many provincial governments under their organization of departments of municipal affairs, which exist solely to help town and municipal governments and render many services to these local governments.

A weakness under the old form of government was the lack of continuity. The mayor and council were elected for a two-year term only, and one half of the council were replaced annually. The policy of almost all councils was not to commit incoming council to any future policy. Under the town manager's system, the residents still elect a mayor and council, who appoint the town manager and who is responsible to the council regarding policy. The town manager carries out the views in the best and most economical manner. Having started in South Carolina in 1912 it spread to other American cities, and was introduced to Canada in 1913 at Sherbrooke P. Q. where it is still operating. Today communities with a population of under 500 have town managers as well as the city of Montreal, Canada's largest metropolitan centre.

S'Side Airport Medical Officer Is Transferred

Squadron Leader N. R. McGregor, senior medical officer at R. C. A. F. Station Summerside for the past two years, has recently been transferred to the R. C. A. F. Institute of Aviation Medicine in Toronto and will leave the Island on Saturday to take up his new duties.

For the past two years Squadron Leader McGregor has been responsible for the operation of R. C. A. F.'s base hospital and has daily given treatment and medical advice to station personnel.

Enlisting in the R. C. A. F. during September of 1941, S-L McGregor trained as a navigator and served with 428 Squadron in Bomber Command. During a bombing raid his aircraft, a Halifax bomber was forced down in occupied France. The French underground located the crew and assisted in their escape to England some four months later.

After the war S-L McGregor entered the Medical School of the University of Western Ontario in London, graduating as a doctor in 1950. He then re-enlisted in the R. C. A. F. as medical officer.

Summerside R. C. A. F. Station Planning Rodeo On August 31

The gates of R. C. A. F. Station, Summerside, will open to the public on Friday, August 31st, at 1:00 p.m. Atlantic Standard Time to enable the general public to attend a truck rodeo designed to test the driving skill of R. C. A. F. personnel and Department of National Defense employees.

The competition will be held on the station parade square. Friday's competition is a preliminary to the Maritime Air Command competition which will be held at R. C. A. F. Station, Summerside on the 30th and 21st of September. The public is welcome to attend both competitions.

The contestants are personnel of the station's Mobile Equipment Section. Seven service drivers and three civilians will compete for prizes and the privilege of representing Summerside in the Command rodeo. Prizes will be awarded to the drivers standing first, second and third. The contestants placing first and second will represent the station during the September competition.

During the rodeo each driver will make one run in a three-and-covered truck over a course consisting of six intricate obstacles. He is allowed a maximum time of eight minutes to complete the course but must not take less than three minutes. The course starts with a serpentine, consisting of a number of barrels spaced truck wide apart. The driver is required to weave backwards through the barrels and then weaves forward. He must not touch any of the barrels. He will then back into a series of narrow alleys, drive down a straight path, the width of his vehicle plus six inches, and parallel park in a limited space. The final two obstacles consist of backing into a blind alley, stopping exactly six inches from the end and driving down a narrow path which grows narrower towards the end. His truck must be stopped within six inches of the finish line. Throughout his run he is required to make all necessary hand signals. When required to back up, the rear view mirror only can be used.

To qualify for the competition a driver must have completed twelve months of accident free driving and passed a written examination on rules of the road and trucking industry, first aid and fire fighting. The tests are designed to improve the driving skills, courtesy and safe driving habits of R. C. A. F. drivers and are held annually at military stations across Canada.
