OVERDUE.—The iron ship Winslow, lumber laden, Capt. Alex. Nicholson, sailed from St. John, N. B., on the 26th last November bound for Great Britain. Since that time no tidings of her has been received. It is said that the captain had his wife and son with him on the voyage. In addition to these the captain's brother, Mr. John Nicholson, a resident of Montague Bridge, was also on board the ship. The latter was one of our most worthy citizens and leaves a wife and two children behind him. Both are sons of Mr. Donald Nicholson, of Valleyfield, and highly respected. Although great fears are entertained for their safety, yet it is possible they may turn up all safe.

ANOTHER ROBBERY.—The residence of Mr. Richard Fitzpatrick, Fitzroy Street, east, was entered by a burglar between eleven and twelve o'clock last night, and the sum of \$23 was stolen therefrom. Mr. Fitzpatrick, who is in the employ of the Island Railway as sectionman, received his monthly pay at six o'clock yesterday, and after tea he put the amount above mentioned in a small writing desk, which was on a table in the sitting room, a few feet from the front window. The burglar effected an entrance through the window of this sitting room, using lighted matches to see what he was about. This morning several burnt matches were found on the sidewalk, directly under the window. Mr. Fitzpatrick has no idea as to the identity of the guilty person.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, March 4.

Dr. Montague, the newly elected member for Haldimand, was introduced by Messrs. Patterson (of Essex) and Tisdale, and took his seat amid great applause from the Conservative benches.

The House then went into committee on the bill respecting bills of exchange, cheques and promissory notes, which continued until recess.

Hon. Mr. Foster moved the House into committee of supply.

Mr. Laurier moved in amendment a motion censuring the government for the expenditure made during recess for the survey of the proposed line of railway between Harvey and Salisbury, and for which there was no parliamentary appropriation. Mr. Foster asked that the motion be not moved to-night, as Sir John MacDonald, Minister of Railways, was unwell, and could not be present. Mr. Laurier agreed to this.

The House went into supply, taking up the customs' estimates. The Short Line Railway, and Moncton and P. E. I. Railway Company bills passed the railway committee this morning without amendment. The Hall Construction Company's bill was sent to the sub-committee to report on.

Hon. Peter McLaren, of Perth, who succeeds the late Senator Turner, was sworn in to-day and escorted to his seat. In the Senate this afternoon the discussion on the question of establishing a Canadian mint, as introduced by Senator McInnis, occupied the greater portion of the session. Hon. Mr. Abbott stated that the Government was opposed to any such proposal, and also that the Government would introduce the Banking Act in the Commons in a few days. The Orange Bill was read a first time, and the second reading fixed for Friday. It is understood that the Catholic Senators will not offer any amendments, but will divide the House on the question.

A Great Flood.

CAIRO, Ill., March 4.

The Ohio river is now over fifty miles wide at this point, forming a solid sheet of water, except for the narrow strips of rock-bound earth upon which the Mobile & Ohio and Illinois Central Railroads are built. A mile below here it joins the Mississippi which extends into Missouri another 50 miles, making the combined width of the two rivers of a hundred miles. The current is terrific, and brings great inundations of heavy drift, making navigation perilous. The ferry boat Three States made two trips to East Cairo yesterday, and one up the Mississippi to Missouri, rescuing the people caught out on the ground they supposed beyond the reach of the flood, but which was being rapidly submerged. At Paducah, Ky., there is much uneasiness. The city is not protected by levees, and the water has raised within a few feet of the door of the Richmond House, which stands on the river front. Two great tobacco warehouses are flooded.

British Parliament

LONDON, March 4.

The Irish land bill, which will be introduced in the House of Commons by the government, provides for state aided migration, abolishing the land courts and the land commission.

In the debate on Gladstone's amendment to Smith's motion, that the House adopt the report of the Parnell Commission, Harrington produced telegrams to the agents of the Times in America, going to show that after Sir Richard Webster had apologized for the forgeries, the Times endeavored to procure evidence to establish their authenticity. He said that the telegrams proved a conspiracy deeper and fouler than anything proved against the Parnellites.

Friendly Relations.

ROME, March 4.

The Green Book in regard to Abyssinia, just issued, states that King Menelek will accept Italy's assistance in all negotiations with other powers, and will give Italy the preference in all industrial and commercial concessions.

The Turf in Australia.

MELBOURNE, March 4.

Hon. Mr. White's three-year-old Drednaught won the Australian cup to-day at 2 1/2 miles in 3:59 1/2, the fastest time on record.

Another Protest.

OTTAWA, March 4.

A protest has been entered against the return of Mr. Montague, M. P., for Haldimand.
