Mr. and Mrs. Peter Pope were visitors on Sunday at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Lockhart.

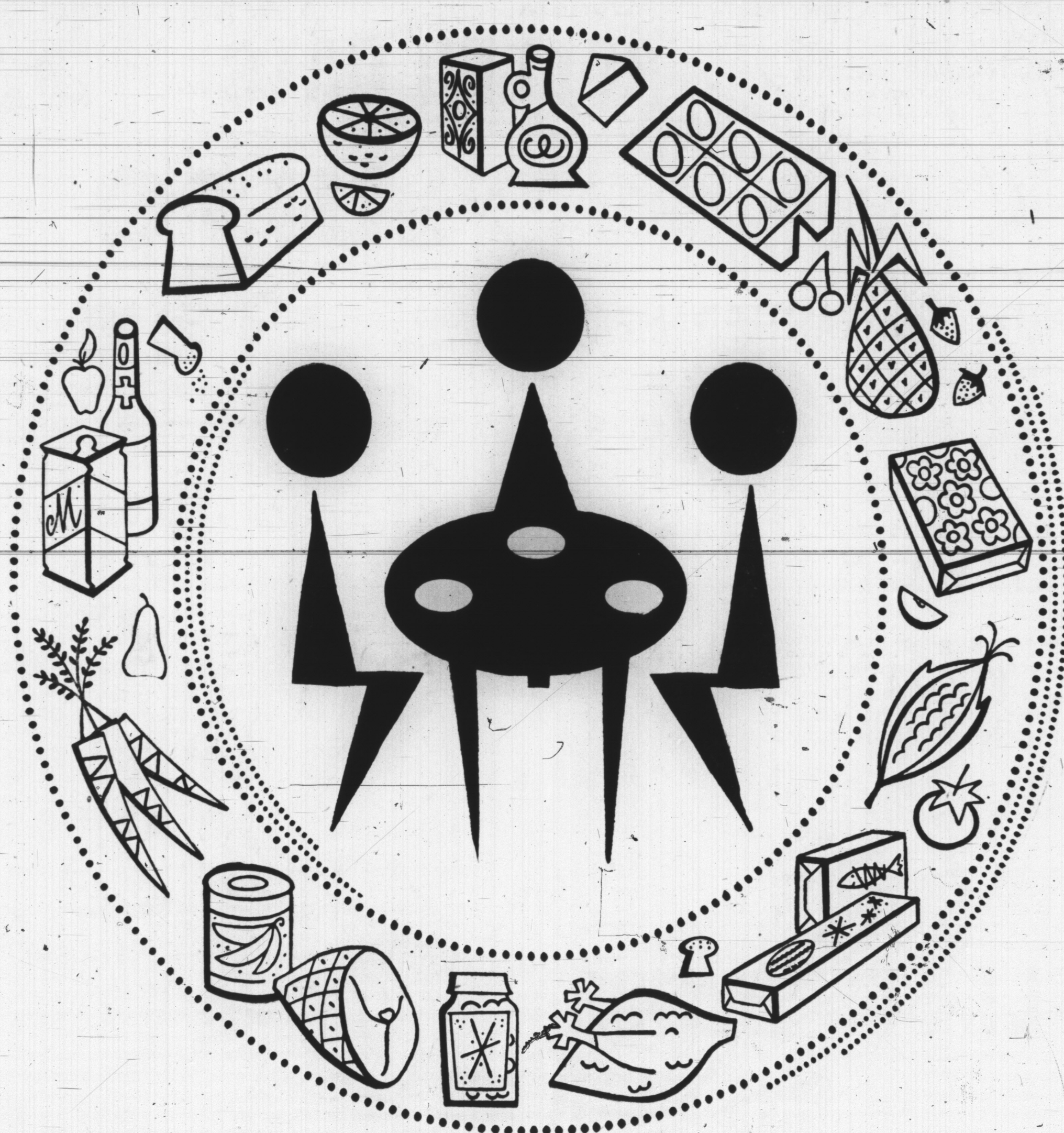
Mrs. F. Bearsto spent the weekend at her home in Malpeque.

GET OFF ICE FLOE

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet scientists who manned an Arctic ice floe for 40 months are being evacuated. Tass news agency said today. Known as "North Pole 6," the five-by-eight-mile floe was first occupied in April, 1955, when it was about 200 miles from Wrangel Island off northeastern Siberia. It now is about 100 miles northeast of Greenland, Tass said, after drifting more than 8,400 miles. The news agency said the floe is being abandoned because its southern drift has made it useless for further observations.
