A resident of Parkdale contacted us recently with some news on Orin Carver, a former Parkdale and Charlottetown member of noted hockey fame. Orin moved to St. John's a little over a year ago to take over the duties of district manager for the Irving Oil Company.

Orin first left Charlottetown to battle in foreign hockey wars when he was 20 years old and lined up with a Halifax junior club. The Halifax club traveled to Ottawa that year to battle for the Memorial Cup, but was defeated by the Ottawa Senators. The following year Carver lined up with Barrie Flyers in Ontario, at the beginning of the season, but returned to Charlottetown later in the same season to play in the Maritime Senior League, when Maritime senior hockey was at a high level. While in Maritime, the personal staff for the Herby Bears of the American Hockey League, was in the loop at that time.

Orin had a brief look at big time hockey, as he attended camp with the New York Rangers of the National Hockey League, and the Cleveland Barons of the American Hockey League. Carver made his first journey to Newfoundland when he was 26 years old. Wes Traitor was extremely active in Newfoundland hockey circles at that time and Traitor obtained Orin for the Grand Falls pucksters. Carver returned here the following season and it was because of a transfer with the Irving Oil company that he returned to Newfoundland.

Although quite busy with his duties for the company, Carver has found time to play starting roles on two Newfoundland championship teams and is hoping to be a member of a third in the near future. Orin has several other brothers residing in Charlottetown at present whom we well know for their hockey prowess in former years.

Orin is married to Alice and "Skip" whom have both retired from the game, but Alice still finds it hard to sit on the bench and he is MacDougall's coaching duties on the Johnny's Flying Hawks. This season, we wouldn't be at all surprised if some night Alice gets tired of her coaching role, you see the veteran winger back on the ice.

Orin is married and the father of two boys and two girls. It is always good to hear of a former Island sports figure and his progress on foreign soil. Best of luck to Orin in Newfoundland.

Lakehead All-Stars

PORT WILLIAM (CP)—The touring Russian national team will have a 2-3 tie here Monday night by a team of Lakehead Senior All-Stars bolstered by four junior players.

The tie was the best showing made by any Canadian group so far during the Russians' tour. The Russians cut a spectacular record by winning their first game with a 2-2 tie over Montreal. Junior Canadians and dumped Canada's National team 4-0 Sunday in Toronto.

The Lakehead team held a 1-0 lead after the first period but the Russians evened the score 1-1 after 40 minutes.

Alexander, Almetov, Konstantin Loktev and Veniamin Alexandrov from the Russian team marksmen Roger Savitski, Jim Munro and Murray Smith scored for the All-Stars.

The Lakehead team took

eight of the 14 penalties handed out in the game which was played in a 2,500 seat arena before a capacity crowd of 4,500 fans.

Contributing to the All-Star's success was the outstanding performance of goaltender Joe Sawicki. The defenseman blocked 29 shots. Russia's Victor Konvalenko enjoyed a relatively easy night, as he was called on to make only eight saves.

Sawicki opened the scoring at the 17-second mark of the first period with the first shot by elite Russian team. Almetov scored at 4:30 of the second period and the teams evened into the third period at 11:11.

Russia moved two goals ahead on scores by Loktev at 8:05 and by Alexander at the 13:18 mark.

Then Munro, a junior, beat Konvalenko from 20 feet out at the 18:38 mark and triggered a tremendous drive by his teammates.

Twelve seconds later Smith, another junior, scored for the All-Stars. The Russian net to end the scoring. 7 p.m.

Giardella to Fight Tiger Philadelphia Next June

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—A return title fight between middleweight champion Joe Giardella and Dick Tiger of Nigeria looks like a loser than a winner. The 34-year-old champion had the thick welt under his left eye and a red scar over the eye and reddish bruises under the right eye. Giardella, fresh from a close win over Robin Carter Monday night, seemed headed Tuesday although he also talked about defence against the 44-year-old Sugar Ray Robinson or maybe with the winner of a Tiger-Joe Archer fight.

"We got an offer of \$15,000 for a title fight with Robinson in January for the Dapper Club in Pittsburgh," said Arnold Giovannetti, Giardella's adviser. "But we did promise Don Eibaum that 'so soon and April or May would be better.'"

Giardella, 170 lbs., doesn't want to fight in June or July. My wife is expecting her fourth child and I don't want to fight then. I get more nervous than the day does.

GOING TO REST—"I'm going to rest about a month. Then I'll take a couple of non-title fights."

Giardella, interviewed at a press conference, said he's glad to meet the winner of a fight between Carter of New York, No. 1 contender, and Tiger, who he had de-throned a year ago and who now is rated
