IN THIS CORNER!

Harry Poulton, who lost a ten pound decision to the Canadian middleweight champion Yvon Durelle in Stellarton a month and a half ago will return to Stellarton next Monday night to fight Hans Simon. The latter is a German immigrant, who knocked out Freddy Stewart of New Glasgow in four rounds early in June. Simon is very highly regarded and fight fans around New Glasgow at the time of the Poulton-Durelle scrap were talking in glowing terms about the German boxer who had just acted in their midst.

Simon was introduced to the fight crowd that night before the title fight got underway and received a big hand. A ringside expert from New Glasgow who was sitting beside us stated that Simon was as good as any middleweight in the Maritimes. The German's high rating stemmed from his showing against Stewart. Freddy was pretty highly regarded before the German came along and is still one of the better men in his class in the Maritimes today.

The fight will be a good tune-up for Poulton before he meets Kid Baker in a fight at the Forum here later on. Baker will be remembered as the capable welterweight who stopped Duck Trainor in the seventh round here less than two weeks ago. It is not known when the Poulton-Baker fight will be staged but promoter Ivan Doherty of the Boosters Club stated it would follow the Durelle-Jordan bout which will probably take place at the Forum on August 31.

Durelle will face the stiffest test of his career when he steps inside the ropes with Jordan, the cagey old mitt-slinger from Atlantic City, New Jersey. Durelle has a reputation as a rugged puncher but we think he will have to put Jordan away in the early rounds of the fight if he is to win the bout. Before the Edwards fight manager Jack Friday stated that Jordan was slow to warm up and that Edwards could only win if he could kayo the Atlantic City battler in the early rounds. He ran true to Jack's words in the ring. For two rounds he looked sluggish but from the third on he was a smooth, capable fighting machine.

The Basilea Youth Club and Canada Packers went one up yesterday in their best of three play-off series in the City Softball League. For four innings Sonny Stull handcuffed the B.Y.C. batters but in the fifth Stull began to lose his stuff and the Youth Clubbers got to him. One of the best plays of the game resulted in the final out. Neil MacNevin blasted a B.Y.C. pitch into the woods on the Knights Diamond but the B.Y.C. by means of a four man relay retired the big policeman at the plate as he tried to stretch the hit into a homer. It was a very smart play and many home runs have been scored on balls that were not hit as far as MacNevin's drive.

The City Softball League is pretty solid proof of the fact that ball players who want to play ball can do so at a minimum amount of cost and effort. It is strictly a democratic effort run by the players and for the players. The players have their own executive made up of a member from each team. The boys dip into their own pockets in most cases to take care of the expenses which run to about \$75.00 a year per team. In addition to that they must pay for the umpires and this amounts to \$2.00 per game. As could be expected there have been a number of headaches for League President Wendell Gillis and his executives but considering the results that have been achieved the small number of difficulties involved have been well worth while. The League has made it possible for approximately 140 boys and young men to compete in athletics throughout the summer months. Each of those players will play an average of nearly 30 games for a price of about \$6.00 which is a pretty good bargain in any league.

John Paul, the veteran long-distance runner, will hit the track once more when he competes this week in the Scottish games down in Saint Anne's, Cape Breton. These games are an annual event and they are highlighted by a 12-mile road race. John has won this gruelling race for three years in a row and is now the permanent owner of the McGurdy Trophy which was donated to any athlete who could win the race three consecutive times. John Paul hopes to win three more in a row. The race will be held on Wednesday.

The New York Yankees crushed the lowly St. Louis Browns 11-3 with an 18-hit attack Monday against three hapless hurlers. It was the only day game in the abbreviated major-league schedule.

Scoring early and often, the Yankees routed their one-time nemesis, stoppawp Bob Cain, in a four-run fourth inning, and continued their slugfest against righthanders Marlin Stuart and Mike Blyzka.

The Yankees ripped off four triples and three doubles. One of the doubles was by Gus Triandos, 24-year-old rookie brought up from Birmingham, Ala., to play first base. It was the only hit he made in five times at bat.

Hank Bauer cracked two triples and drove in three runs. Phil Rizuto and Billy Martin got the other triples.

Held to five scattered hits through seven innings, the Browns jumped on Whitey Ford for two of their runs after two were out in the eighth.

In Monday's other American League game, the second-place Chicago White Sox remained five

games behind the Yanks by taking a night 1-0 victory from the Washingtons in a night game at Washington.

Billy Pierce, surviving a ninth-inning threat, pitched a two-hitter for the triumph. He fanned nine in winning his 13th game and took over the major-league strikeout lead from Philadelphia Phillies' Robin Roberts with 124.

Lloyd Mangrum Wins Top Prize At Tam O'Shanter

CHICAGO, (AP) — Lloyd Mangrum, a jaunty 39-year-old grandpappy, pocketed the \$3,420 top prize at Tam O'Shanter Monday by winning the All-American golf crown with a pressure-jammed last round of 67.

His 72-hole total of 275 was 13 strokes under par 36-36-73 for the 6,915-yard layout.

Mangrum thus started what he hopes will be another grand slam at the club.

In 1943, he captured both the All-American and following "world championship" meets, a combined effort worth \$25,000. The Tam O'Shanter \$90,000 "world" tournament starts Thursday with the winner receiving \$25,000.

Monday's victory came with a closing nine-hole score of 32 that was clinched by sinking a 22-foot chip on the 18th hole for a birdie three. The triumph put Mangrum ahead of Ben Hogan for the season's money — winning lead, boosting his jackpot to \$18,786.

Mangrum's final 33-32-67 smothered great finishes by his rivals and gave him a three-stroke margin over Ted Frol of New Hartford, N.Y., and defending champion Sam Snead.
