A FORECAST OF WINTER.—The people of Fredericton Sunday morning were surprised to see the roofs of buildings white with snow which had fallen during the night or early in the morning, after which a cold rain storm followed which lasted until noon.

THE valuable household furniture lately contained in the Franklin House, will be sold by auction on the market square, commencing to-morrow. Intending purchasers should call at the salesroom of Messrs. Campbell & Rayden, auctioneers, to inspect the furniture.

THE steamer "Sicily" sailed on Monday from Halifax for London. The principal items of cargo shipped at that port are 14,436 cases of canned lobsters, 210 cattle, and 355 sheep. The value of the cargo taken on board at Halifax is \$126,588. She had also a quantity of cargo taken on board at St. John, and valued at \$6,000, making a total of \$132,588.

A GENTLEMAN left our office to-day a very large duck egg which measured 3 1/2 inches in length, in circumference 6 1/2 inches, and weighed 4 1/2 ounces. He says that those fowls which lay large eggs are not so profitable as they would be if they laid two at a time instead of one. Considering that eggs are sold here by the dozen we think he is about right.

H. M. S. "Griffin," Commander Davies, arrived in this port at noon to-day. The "Griffin" lies in the channel, immediately off Connolly's Wharf. She will remain here until the arrival of H. M. S. "Northampton" on Monday next. His many Charlottetown friends welcome back amongst them once more, Captain Davies, and feel just as proud of his success in his profession, as he probably does himself.

THE St. Lawrence Hotel, one of the finest hotels in this city, was re-opened on Wednesday. The premises have been engaged by Mrs. Robinson who has been for several years the popular proprietor of the Robinson House, Prince Street. The St. Lawrence Hotel is conveniently situated for passengers by railway or by steamers. Transient and permanent boarders will find ample accommodation here, and we bespeak for the new regime a share of public patronage and encouragement.

A MAN by the name of Marshall living in Moncton, N. B., shot his wife through the neck, early yesterday morning. Marshall being a dissipated idle fellow, his wife was obliged to leave him. Angered at this he entered her house, and asking her to go and live with him which she refused, he drew a revolver, fired and ran away. The unfortunate victim lies in a very critical condition which will probably prove fatal. Marshall escaped but is being pursued, and will doubtless be captured.

THE meeting of the Educational Institute to be held on the 8th and 9th inst., promises to be a more than usually interesting one. Return tickets can be obtained for one fare at any station along the railroad, good to return on the 9th, 10th, 11th or 12th. The time is extended through the kindness of the Superintendent of the Railway for the convenience of teachers who may wish to attend the exhibition on Wednesday and Thursday following the Convention. A large public meeting under the auspices of the Institute will be held on the evening of the 8th inst.

UNDER the heading "Industrial Exhibition" the Monetary Times has the following paragraph:—"An assortment of butter tubs, of a construction intended to facilitate examination of their contents and for shipping purposes, is shown by Mr. Henry F. Coombs, of Charlottetown, P. E. I., who also exhibited a model of a life boat, with patent pop lock, and a patent removable wagon-top, possessing advantages for long journeys in rainy or hot weather. The Wheeler Reflector Co., of Boston, for which Mr. Coombs is agent, took first prize for their railway and carriage reflectors, with adjustable lenses."

COMMANDER DAVIES, says the Halifax Herald of H. M. S. "Griffin," on Monday received a despatch from Admiral Commaul, instructing him to proceed to Charlottetown, and there await the arrival of the "Northampton." Commander Davies will feel at home at Charlottetown. He is a native of that city, being a son of the Hon. Benjamin Davies, and elder brother of the Hon. L. H. Davies, M. P., ex-premier of Prince Edward Island. The numerous friends of Commander Davies in Halifax have been glad to welcome him on the North American station; and as he is the first Islander who has risen to rank in her majesty's navy, he will be cordially welcomed home. The "Northampton" is expected to arrive at Charlottetown about the 15th inst.

Charles Stewart's carriage filly, 2 years old, second prize. Kennedy's mare won the Sweep Stake prize. Longworth, Boswell and Lane won a large proportion of the prizes for sheep.

O'Donnell's Statement.

LONDON, Sept. 4.

O'Donnell has made a statement by which he says that Carey and he were sitting together in the cabin of the steamer, that Carey began to fasten a quarrel upon him, when O'Donnell remarked about the rumor that Power, by which name Carey shipped, was Carey; whereupon Carey and he started up, each with a pistol drawn. O'Donnell gripped Carey by the collar and then fired. Carey dropped his pistol and not being fatally shot the first time he tried to pick up his pistol on the floor, when O'Donnell fired again. O'Donnell claims he was acting purely in self-defence.

Failures on the Paris Bourse.

LONDON, Oct. 4.

The Evening Standard in its financial article, says stocks are depressed owing to the numerous failures on the Paris Bourse and to political reports from France. The dullness increased when it transpired that the Secretary of the London and River Plate Bank had absconded. It is estimated that he has defaulted to the extent of \$400,000 which sum he lost in speculation in the Stock Exchange.

Sir Stafford Northcote in Ireland.

BELFAST, Oct. 4.

Sir Stafford Northcote opened a conservative club here yesterday. In reply to an address of welcome he denounced the so-called Nationalists Party and asked the Conservatives of Ireland to unite against what he considered to be destroyers of their religion and their liberties.

Yellow Fever in Mexico.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 4.

A letter from Mazatlan, Mexico, says that between August 5th and September 16th, 330 persons died in that city from yellow fever. At the date of writing the fever was abating for the want of fresh material.

Georgetown Notes.

Oats are beginning to move pretty briskly. Market price, thirty-four cents per bushel.

Everybody was glad to hear of the arrival in the "Gut" of the brig, "New Era" owned by Hon. D. Gordon. She was upwards of fifty days coming across.

Friday and Saturday, twenty-first and twenty-second, ult., reminded us of old times. Looking out in the harbor you could see a fleet of American fishing schooners laying at their anchors where they had run in for shelter.

The United States man-of-war "Swatara" paid us a short visit, going out of the harbor every morning for target practice, and returning in the evening.

Queen's wharf needs repairing for the fall shipping.

The steamer "Beaver" leaves every Monday night for the Magdalen Islands. The Captain reports the heaviest gale of wind he ever witnessed, on last week's trip.

The Patriot makes great howling about the appointment of the Hon. A. J. McDonald to a seat in the Executive Council. It says if the electors had a chance now to decide, he would not represent one-third of the district. I do not think the ex-Governor represented many more at the last Dominion Election or he would not have been returned to the occupation suited him best, viz. a Grit journalist. The late editor of the King's County Advertiser did not make such a show at the last local election. It is true he was returned, but it was home.

Great temperance rally on Wednesday, the third inst. The lovers of temperance and the public at large, are cordially invited to attend the meeting at half-past seven p. m.

British Trade.

The report of the British Board of Trade for the first eight months of the present year contains some items of more than passing interest. A summary shows that the aggregate trade of the United Kingdom, inwards and outwards, was £446,275,285, as compared with £435,572,995, in the same period of last year. For 1883 the exports have been £159,000,000 a decrease of two millions, and the imports £187,000,000, an increase of nearly thirteen millions. Then to this may be added the re-export of foreign and colonial produce, which were forty one million pounds.

The decline in exports was most largely in those to the United States and the British possessions in America and elsewhere. To Russia, Germany, Holland and France, the exports have declined also, but to all other European countries they were increased. Egypt showed a decided increase, as did India, but Brazil, China and Australia went behind. A summary shows Britain's exports to the whole of Europe to have declined slightly

as compared with 1882, and to the United States they were £3,176,891 less. To the British dependencies they were £434,291 greater than last year and to the outer world besides they were £720,000 greater. The decrease of exports on the whole was £2,043,000.
