NOVA SCOTIA GOLD.—Alex. Dick, manager of the Dufferin mine, Salmon River Halifax Co, was in Halifax this week. The Company is putting up a new plant, worth \$75,000, with the aid of which the property will be more cheaply operated. The lead has already yielded over \$2,000,000 in gold, and the present owners expect to reap still greater profits.

CHEESE FACTORY BURNED.—We regret to learn that the cheese factory at Winsloe was burned to the ground last night. The fire occurred at midnight and the man in charge, who slept upstairs, narrowly escaped with his life. About 274 boxes of cheese were manufactured, and of these 104 have been saved. The building, plant and stock were protected by insurance in the office of Mr. Horace Hazard.

CRANBERRY GROWING.—Mr. Henry Shaw, of Waterville, N. S., is an authority on cranberry culture. He has two acres of bog in full bearing, and four acres just set out. Last year he put up 185 barrels of cranberries. He sent 174 barrels to Montreal, and they sold for \$1,155. This gave him \$720, clear, which is an income of 6 per cent. on \$12,000. Every acre of bog in bearing like his, he considers worth \$1,000 in any bank. This is not the only income from cranberries. Last spring he sold \$80.00 worth of vines and the spring previous \$200 worth. An acre in full bearing will yield 100 barrels. Mr. Shaw cleaned up 101 barrels from one acre last year. This year some small patches of bog had been injured by the frost on June 17th.
