The Decline in the Exodus.

From the United States Emigration Returns for the calendar year ended 31st December, 1881, we find that there is a great falling off in the number of persons entering the United States from Canada. The total for 1881 is 95,188 as against 139,761 in 1880, or a decrease of 44,573.

Legislative.

The House has duly made provision for a supply to Her Majesty; and a Bill to repeal the Assessment Act, 1877, has been introduced. While discussing the Budget, there was the usual talk about roads and bridges, wharves and piers.

The summary of Baptists in the United States for the past year shows an increase of about 40,000 members, less than one-fourth of the reported increase for 1880. The total of members is 2,336,022, which embraces Southern as well as Northern Baptists.

The Palestine surveying party, under the supervision of Lieut. Conder, is now at Jerusalem, arranging their observations. They have completed the surveying of 500 square miles, collected more than 600 names, examined 200 ruins, and taken photographs, sketches, and ground plans.

The disestablishment movement in Scotland has met with a discouraging turn in the pronounced opposition of Dr. Kennedy, of the Free Church. Dr. Kennedy is regarded as the Presbyterian Pope of the Highlands, and where he leads the majority of the Highland ministers are expected to follow.

The American missionaries who penetrated through the jungles and fever-stricken country of Unzulia's kingdom, in South-eastern Africa, to his capital, report that the King was delighted to see them, sent greetings to America, and asked to have five missionaries with their families sent to teach his people.

The emigration to the United States during the next six months, promises to amuse phenomenal proportions. At New York alone the arrivals during the week just closed amounted to over 8,000, and it has been claimed that the early spring will see the weekly arrivals mount up to 20,000.

An estate of \$3,000,000 has been divided among religious and charitable institutions in New York. Miss Sarah Burr, the last of three sisters, died on March 1st, leaving the great bulk of the estate handed down to her as a life interest to different societies and institutions.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT THE BUDGET.

Mr. A. C. McDonald's Speech in the House of Commons.

MR. MACDONALD.—I have no objection to the hon. gentleman making an explanation if he chooses. When he rose I was proceeding to refer for a few moments to some remarks made by the member for Charlotte (Mr. Gillmor) during the course of his speech the other day. He said, on that occasion, that he quoted from the leading journal of Charlottetown, a statement that there had been more depression in that town for many years, and went on to trace it to the effect of the National Policy.

Mr. KILLAM.—They always did. Mr. McDonald.—If these hon. gentlemen continue to oppress the protective policy, they must, should they in the dim future return to office, put a duty on those articles of the poor fishermen, if they carry out their theory. The hon. gentleman who has just taken his seat said the policy of the Opposition was not to tax one party at the expense of another. If they should carry out that policy they would have to tax every portion of the people alike, and to do that they would have to put a tax on the necessities used by the poor fishermen, as well as those used by other classes.

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the fisherman is manufactured in our country. His flour is ground out of wheat grown in Canada, his articles of clothing are manufactured here. There is, therefore, no foundation whatever for the assertion that the present policy taxes the poor fisherman. It has been said that the people of the Lower Provinces are prevented from taking flour from the United States with which they very often trade. The fact is quite the reverse. If our vessels go to Boston or New York they can always buy the quality that is used by our people, superior extra flour of Canada, in those markets, and lay it down at their own doors as cheaply as by the St. Lawrence or the Intercolonial Railway.
