

Braves Reclaim N.L. Lead

 Law Burdette spiked Cincinnati's guns with a five-hitter as Milwaukee's Braves reclaimed the National League lead from the Redlegs with a 7-0 victory Tuesday. By splitting the two-game series, the Braves wound up with the same five-percentage-point edge they held when the set started.

Milwaukee splattered 14 hits in the runaway, three by Johnny Logan who homered, doubled and drove in two runs.

Philadelphia beat Pittsburgh 7-2 in the completion of a May 13 suspended game, but then lost to the Bucs 5-3 on Bob Skinner's pinch two-run homer in the ninth. The Chicago Cubs, making the most of five St. Louis errors, beat the Cardinals 7-1 in the only other NL game scheduled.

YANKS RETAIN LEAD
 In the American League, Maury McDermott's pinch bases loaded single in the 12th inning gave New York a 4-3 decision over Baltimore and retained the Yankees' 3 1/2-game lead over second place Chicago. The White Sox smacked Detroit 6-0 behind Jim Wilson's six hits. Third place Cleveland whipped Kansas City 9-3 on home runs by Vic Wertz, Jim Busby and Al Rosen. And Washington edged Boston 6-5 in 11 innings as Jim Lemon tripled for his fourth hit of the game to drive in the tie-breaking run.

Burdette had a breeze setting

down the all-star studded Redlegs. He didn't allow more than one runner in any one inning. It was only the second time this season homer-hitting Cincinnati has been shut out.

FIRST VICTORY
 The Braves got to all-star pitcher Johnny Nuxhall for seven hits and four runs in his 4 1/3 innings, with Logan belted a two-run homer as they scored three in the fourth.

Bill Virdon hit a solo homer in the eighth for the Pirates and Skinner's sock off reliever Jack Meyer, then gave Johnny O'Brien his first major league victory and a total of 3 1/3 hitless innings on the mound. O'Brien, an infielder until last week, came on in the seventh Monday to stop a two-run Phillie spurt.

The Phils led the May 13 game 6-2 when it was called because of a Sunday curfew in the top of the eighth.

The Cardinals, who committed seven errors in the two-game series at Chicago and now are again a game above .500, were baffled by the lefty knucklers of Jim Davis, who won his third with relief help.

Baltimore scored two runs in the ninth to tie the Yankees against reliever Tom Sturdivant, who then held on to get his seventh victory in eight decisions.

The Orioles committed four errors, slightly from the nose when the final bell sounded.

Players Well Pleased With Frick's Deal

NEW YORK (AP)—Major league baseball players, pleased with the \$3,250,000-a-year radio-TV deal completed by commissioner Ford Frick for the world series-all star game rights, may cash a monthly retirement check of \$400, their lawyer said Tuesday.

Norman Lewis, counsel for the major leaguers, estimated that the present monthly payments of \$50 to \$100 to players reaching the age of 50, "unquestionably will be doubled," and added "they may go as high as \$400 a month depending upon where the retirement age is set."

"If a 10-year fan would boost his retirement age to 60, he could probably get 400 or more a month, and if the retirement age is 65, the amount might be closer to 500 a month."

The new five-year contract was signed with NBC Monday. The old contract, a six-year pact which expires after the 1956 world series, brought \$1,150,000 a year.

Rangers Schedule Afternoon Games

NEW YORK (CP)—New York Rangers have arranged their 1956-57 National Hockey League schedule to play two Saturday afternoon games at Madison Square Garden, General Manager Muzz Patrick announced Tuesday.

This calls for afternoon dates, starting at 2 p.m., Jan. 5 and Feb. 2, and will be part of a CBS-TV network program of big league hockey.

Patrick said he hopes the afternoon experiment will continue to increase patronage among family groups as has been evident since the Rangers decided on a 7 o'clock starting time for their Sunday night hockey games.
