Italian - Yugoslavian Relations Remain Tense

Airmen Tell Of Flaming Crash In Manitoba Muskeg

CHURCHILL, Man., (CP) — A tall, rugged-looking Englishman told the story Monday of a wilderness plane crash in which a Lancaster bomber rammed into northern Manitoba muskeg, bounced and performed a flaming cartwheel into a shallow lake.
FO. Joe Murray, 30, of Warrington, England and Missoula, Mont., was interviewed with other members of the eight-man crew of the plane missing since Aug. 22 in rough lake-studded Northern Manitoba.
The aircraft was located Saturday when a flashing mirror in the hands of FO. T. A. R. Stammers, 21, of Antigua, British West Indies, caught the eye of a spotter in a Winnipeg-based Dakota search plane.
FO. Murray, a veteran of eight years in the RAF and of two other major crashes, sported a wound around the bridge of his nose as he talked to reporters flown from Winnipeg in the same Dakota that found the lost craft.

British And U. S. Urge Policy of Caution

BELGRADE. (Reuters) — Yugoslavia Monday denied any plan to annex Trieste's Zone B and countered with a charge that Italian soldiers had violated Yugoslav territory.
Belgrade radio said Yugoslavians will file a diplomatic protest Tuesday citing charges that Italian soldiers crossed 50 yards into Yugoslavia Monday while other army units carried out manoeuvres along the frontier.
The new Belgrade charge was promptly denied by Italy as relations between the two countries remained tense.
Earlier Monday the sudden week-end flareup over the free territory of Trieste appeared to be subsiding. Some measure of calm was restored by an appeal for moderation from Britain, the United States and France.

To Bring Actions Under Federal Election Act

The following statement was issued today by Melvin McQuaid, president of the King's County Progressive Conservative Association:
"At a meeting of the executive of our association, held on the evening of Monday, Aug. 31, information as to alleged infractions of the Dominion Election Act during the federal election of Aug. 10, as they pertained to King's County, were reviewed.

In fairness to our candidate, to our workers and to those who supported us in this campaign, we are convinced that we now have no choice but to proceed upon the information which has been voluntarily submitted to us in good faith.
"We are therefore issuing instructions to our attorney to take the necessary steps to bring these alleged offences before the court together with any others which may later be brought to our attention."

Little Headway Against Forest Fires In Ontario

TORONTO. (CP) — Flames from 115 fires devoured acre upon acre of jackpine and hardwood stands Monday as an army of 1,300 men fought against one of the worst outbreaks in history throughout Ontario timberlands. Oncoming lightning threatened new blazes.
Twelve fires raged unchecked over parched woodlands in the north despite the operations of men, planes, bulldozers, small trucks and canoes. The fires, feeding on timber left dry by a severe heat wave, have already caused the deaths of two men and a boy and destroyed thousands of dollars worth of lumber.
10 Fires Under Control
The Ontario department of lands and forest said 10 fires were brought under control during the day, but feared additional outbreaks.
One department official said: "We are holding our own, but we are not getting a break from the weather. No heavy rainfall is predicted and lightning storms could make it rough. The situation is serious."
Nearly 800 fire-fighters were having a rough time of it in the North Bay district where 28 fires are raging. Eight of the blazes are out of control and spreading swiftly through mixed timber and cut-over areas.

Banks To Close All Day Saturday In Charlottetown

A change in banking hours in Charlottetown will give employees a long weekend to themselves as starting on September 19 all banks in the city will remain closed on Saturday mornings.
To give the public an opportunity of transacting its regular business the Friday hours will be lengthened. Effective September 18 the banks will be open Fridays from 9:30 in the morning until 4:30 in the afternoon. Announcement to the above effect was made yesterday by Mr. W. R. Cruikshank, chairman of the board of management, Charlottetown Clearing House, which represents all the chartered banks in the city.

N. Y. Stocks In New Low For Year

NEW YORK. (AP) — The stock market fell Monday to a new low for the year. Selling was heavy. All sections of the market were caught in the fall which carried the Associated Press average of 60 stocks down \$2.20 to a close of \$102.40.
That is a new low for the year in the average, lowest since mid-May of last year.
Selling built the volume up to 2,190,000 shares, one of the largest days of the year. Friday's total was 1,060,000 shares.

HALIFAX. (CP) — Maritimers sweltered again Monday as a late summer heat wave continued.

The heat wave began Saturday when Halifax reached 87, and continued over the week-end.
The temperature was 81 at Charlottetown.

Bad Weather Holds Up Search

HALIFAX. (CP) — Bad weather in Northern Quebec Monday held up search for a missing Norseman plane that disappeared a week ago on a flight from Fort Chimo to Nitchequon, Que., about 300 miles north of Quebec City.
R.C.A.F. search headquarters here said seven planes were ready to take off early Tuesday if weather conditions improve. Six men, including a crew of two, were aboard the missing aircraft, owned by Mont Laurier Airways of Roberval, Que. Their names were not known here.
The search fleet comprises R.C.A.F. planes from Summerside, P.E.I., Torbay, Nfld., and Goose Bay, Labrador, and three Mont Laurier aircraft.
Squad Leader M. J. Cowie of Ottawa, Ont., is in charge of the aerial search.

Callow Coach At Toronto Fair

TORONTO. (CP) — The Callow wheelchair coach, brainchild of Walter Callow, blind invalid of Halifax, arrived at the Canadian National Exhibition Monday, and prepared to begin its special duties.
The coach, designed to assist the handicapped in getting outdoors, was scheduled to transport several invalids to the ONE grounds for tonight's grandstand performance.
Accompanying the coach as hostesses were U. M. Green and Kay MacEachern, both of Halifax. L. MacDonald of Halifax is driving the coach, which will carry 12 wheelchair and 11 walking patients.
The coach leaves Toronto Sept. 9 for Urbana, Ill. During its stay here it is to continue a daily schedule of transporting shut-ins to the "ex".

Delay Opening Of Schools In Nfld.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., (CP) — Ninety thousand Newfoundland school children were granted an extra two weeks' vacation Monday because of the worst polio outbreak in the province's history.
Health Minister Philip Forsy announced following a series of meetings that the schools, originally scheduled to open Tuesday, will remain closed until Sept. 14.
So far this year there have been 110 cases and six deaths from Polio in Newfoundland.

New Atomic Explosion Reported In Russia

WASHINGTON. (AP) — The United States Atomic Energy Commission said Monday night another explosion of a fission type took place in Russian territory Aug. 23 and was "in the same range of energy release as our recent Nevada tests."
The use of the term fission indicated that the explosion probably was of the type used in a atomic energy commission statement said:
"On Aug. 23, 1953 a fission explosion took place in Russian territory. The explosion was in the same range of energy release as our recent Nevada tests and would appear to be part of a series. If this proves to be the case, no further announcements will be made unless intelligence indicates information of greater interest."
The commission had confirmed 10 days ago that Russia had conducted an atomic test Aug. 12.
AEC said that the Aug. 12 test involved both fission and thermonuclear reactions.
Thermonuclear is the word scientists use to describe a hydrogen explosion.
The conventional uranium bombs produce their energy from the fission or splitting of atoms while the hydrogen bombs would derive their force from the fusion of hydrogen atoms to produce helium.

Mr. Alexander MacLeod, 72, retired Clerk in the Registry of Deeds and former Chief Clerk in the Provincial Tax Office, died suddenly at his Malpeque Road home yesterday. He had been ill for some time previously, but his passing came as a surprise and shock to his many friends.
He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Angus MacLeod, Heatherdale, and his father was at one time the Conservative M.L.A. for his district. Born in Heatherdale, he attended school there and at Montague later entering Prince of Wales College where he won the entrance scholarship for King's County. While at the College he completed

Tourist Deficit For Canada Increased

OTTAWA. (CP) — Canadian tourists last year spent \$37,000,000 more in the United States than was spent in Canada by Americans.
This for the first time Canada experienced a deficit in her tourist account with her big southern neighbour—a reversal of the \$12,000,000 surplus in 1951 and the peak \$154,000,000 surplus in 1949.
Flush Canadian tourists last year took an unprecedented \$293,600,000 into the U. S. pot, up from \$245,900,000 in 1951, the Bureau of Statistics reported Monday. Americans spent \$257,000,000 in Canada, down from \$258,000,000 in 1951 and the peak of \$267,000,000 in 1948 and 1949.
