

Water Is Big Problem In Govt. Garage Fire

Four sirens screamed yesterday afternoon as city firemen rushed to douse a fire which broke out in the Government Garage at the east end of Gordon Street shortly after 3.30 p.m.

An explosion in a steam generator believed caused by a pressure build-up started things off. The generator is one which makes steam used for washing heavy equipment. At the time the fire broke out a motor grader was being cleaned.

Firemen experienced the greatest difficulty in extinguishing the blaze in the heavy timbered floor of the second story where the heat of the fire had gone through the paint.

WATER HARD TO FIND
Five streams sought the blaze under control within about ten minutes of their arrival. In spite of technical difficulties, obtaining water to fight the fire was not easy.

The disappointing small amount of water to fight the fire was not easy. The hydrant closest to the building had been newly installed and was completely dry, reported Deputy Fire Chief Gordon Stewart.

A scanty but appreciative audience greeted the Shaw festival's opening performances of "The Man of Destiny" and "How the Lid Led to Her Husband" at Queen Charlotte High School auditorium last night.

Speaking before the first play, producer-director Lionel Dixon urged the audience to inform fellow Islanders about the festival, but noted they were not to be doing so, rather working to earn that support, "which is quite a different thing."

The disappointingly small audience warmly applauded the actors' performance of the playwright's sharp dialogue in both one-act plays, bearing out a recent statement by Mr. Dixon that the calibre of the festival plays is neither second rate nor highbrow.

"The Man of Destiny" set in an inn in 18th century Italy, portrays a "different side" of Napoleon Bonaparte in his battle of wits with the "strange lady" who has intercepted his dispatches. The talented Lieutenant Coffin portrays the strange lady, and Kenneth Doiron, Bassant, and Mrs. George Kenney, Ellivallote.

"How the Lid Led to Her Husband" is a farce on Shaw's own play "Candida". It features a talkative innkeeper is Charles Smith, another former actor with the St. Dunstan's players, Douglas C.
