

# Centennial Book To Be Published

A souvenir booklet commemorating the 100th anniversary of the Fathers of Confederation meeting in Charlottetown in 1864 will be published by the board of directors of the Centennial. The booklet will contain about 100 pages and be roughly 12" x 10" in size. It will be in full color and the directors feel it will be a distinguished and attractive souvenir for the numerous visitors who are coming to the province next year.

The booklet will contain illustrations of Canadian symbols, scenes, and historical events, articles on Confederation, and on the Fathers of Confederation.

This project is not, of course, a money-making one; it is only to produce a good booklet, the directors said. It is priced to sell at \$1.00.

# Freight On Arctic Rivers Shows Decline This Season

EDMONTON (CP)—Volume of freight hauled on the Athabasca and Mackenzie River systems will be down slightly this year, says an official of Northern Transportation Company Limited.

W. B. Hunter, company director, said the Crown corporation's tons will have fallen about 10,000 tons of freight when the season ends this year. The company hauled 11,568 tons in 1962 and 128,234 tons in 1961. Mr. Hunter said a decreased need for supplies, particularly shipments of sulphur for use at Gunnar and Eldorado mines near Lake Athabasca in northern Saskatchewan, accounts for the freight-volume drop.

However, Mr. Hunter said, a new avenue to northern river transportation may have been opened by the shipment of an oil drilling rig to Colville River, Alaska.

He said he is hopeful his company will move more drilling rigs in the future. He said this will not only open an outlet for supplies from the Edmonton area but may open the western Arctic to Northern Transportation tugs and barges.

Late reports indicated all the crew rode out the storm without difficulty and one said 36 men played poker and had midnight supper, then went to sleep as Cindy whipped up the gulf.

(Continued from page 1) bomber. A justice department spokesman in Washington said the FBI's report was "very extensive indeed."

Meanwhile, two white youths were in jail for murder charges in the Sunday slaying of a Negro boy, and attendance at an integrated school indicated a white boycott was losing steam.

Sheriff Melvin Bailey said Michael Lee Farley and Larry Joe Sims, 18-year-old high school students, were charged with murder in the death of Virgil Ware, a 15-year-old Negro.

An investigation continued into the fatal shooting by policemen Sunday of 16-year-old Johnnie Robinson, a Negro. Detectives said officers fired at the ground in breaking up a crowd of rock-throwing Negroes. Robinson was hit in the back by a charge of buckshot.

School attendance jumped Tuesday from 666 to 754 at West End High, one of the integrated schools. While students have been making a boycott, enrollment is 1,442.

Attendance was generally improved throughout the Birmingham system.

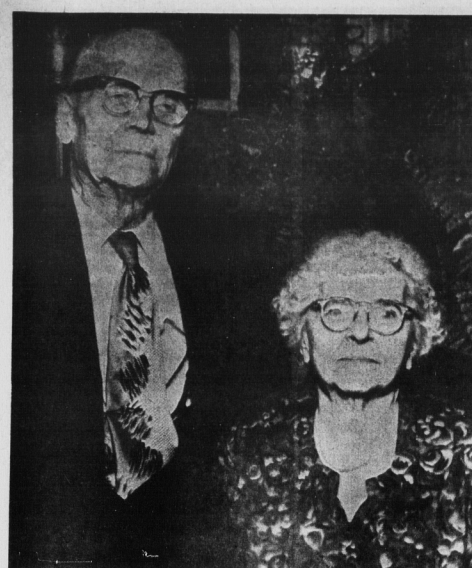

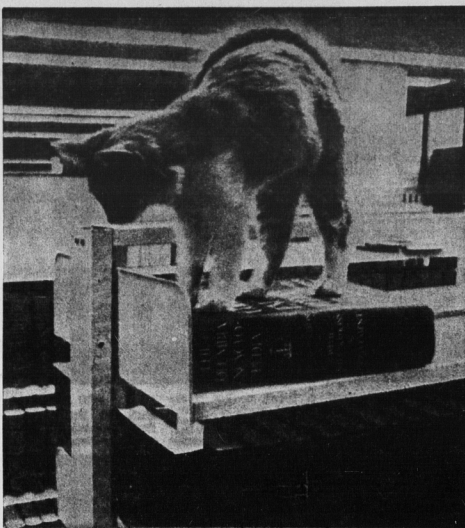

# Will Wheat Sale Influence Votes?

OTTAWA (CP) — Will the Prairie farmer give his vote to whichever government sells the most wheat?

This is a question that the Liberal and Conservative parties in Ottawa would like to have answered clearly. But present indications are they want the answer to come out gradually in the form of mounting public opinion.

Neither party is believed to be really anxious at this juncture to put the question to the test in an immediate general election.

The fact that the Liberals were able last April to win only three Prairie constituencies—and those three in the urban centres of Winnipeg and Calgary—is generally attributed to the former Conservative government's success in clearing the Prairie wheat surplus through sales to Communist China.
