THE WAR NEWS FROM AFRICA.

Buller's Movements Are Mysterious.

BOERS EAST OF LADYSMITH EXPECT AN ATTACK.

Some Fighting Reported at Ladysmith

Canadians Retire to Belmont from Richmond and Thornhill—Opportune Arrival of Macdonald's Brigade—Remington Scouts—Boer Tactics—Other news.

THE GENERAL SITUATION.

LONDON, Feb. 1.—Absolutely no news of importance from the seat of war was allowed to reach London yesterday.

What General Buller is doing is a sealed mystery.

But a hint was given in a telegram from Ladysmith, of Saturday's date, via Estcourt, which states that the Boers were evidently in a state of alarm to the east of the besieged city—evidently expecting an attack.

In the North of Cape Colony, while there is no fresh intelligence, there is no doubt that General Gatacre is about to begin some hard fighting and make a movement simultaneously with General French, Kelly-Kenny and Brabant.

As to Home affairs, the decisive vote on the amendment to the reply to the Queen's speech in favor of the Government in the House of Commons last night, and the results of the York Parliamentary election, where a Unionist was elected by an overwhelming majority to succeed Lord Charles Beresford, are taken to indicate that the country is standing behind Lord Salisbury's Cabinet and will continue to do so until a war is brought to a successful conclusion.

CANADIANS RETURN.

TORONTO, Feb. 7.—Mr. Hamilton, the war correspondent of the Globe, cables as follows from Belmont: Canadians returned to Belmont today from Richmond and Thornhill.

FIGHTING AT LADYSMITH.

MODDER SPRUIT, Feb. 7.—Messages from Ladysmith, dated 5th February, says that continuous cannon-ading has been proceeding since five o'clock in the morning, with the occasional roar of Long Tom. The firing, it is added, continues.

BOER TACTICS.

MODDER SPRUIT, Feb. 5.—On Saturday the Pretoria corps discovered a party of British from Ladysmith entrenched at a railway bridge, cutting the grass.

A party of Boers, despatched to the scene, was attacked from the trenches and all retreated except four who, permitted the British to advance within 50 yards, when they fired a volley killing three men. This was seen from the British fort which fired a shell and sent the cavalry to assist the British. The Boers beat them back killing two men.

AN IMPORTANT MOVEMENT.

LONDON, Feb. 7.—The Standard has the following despatch, dated February 5th, from Koppies-Dam:

"General McDonald, with a brigade of infantry, a regiment of Lancers and one battery has reached here from Modder river camp in what is regarded as an im-

portant movement to the right of the Boer position at Magersfontein.

Koppies Dam commands the roads from Kimberley to Hopetown and Douglas. The Boer's laagers at Kamuel Hoek and Griqua Town are within striking distance.

The arrival of General Macdonald's column was opportune, as it just prevented two large commandoes from effecting a junction. He holds both banks of the river.

Our Lancers had two brushes with the Boer patrols.

There is great activity among the enemy. A strong force is concentrating to oppose our further advance.

The troops suffered from heat and a scarcity of water during the march.

OVERNMENT WELL SUSTAINED.

LONDON, Feb. 7.—The House of Commons rejected Lord Edmund Fitzmaurice's amendment to the address in reply to the speech from the throne. The vote was as follows: Against the amendment, 352; for the amendment, 139; majority, 213. Irish members not voting, 78.

Herbert Asquith, Home Secretary in the Rosebery ministry startled the House with the support that he gave the government. He said that the government done everything possible to avert the war, which Premier Kruger had brought on himself, and he contended that the majority of the country was with him. It is believed this speech is a nail in the coffin of Kruger's hopes.

REMINGTON SCOUTS.

LONDON, Feb. 7.—The World says, it learns that Lord Methuen has disbanded the Remington Scouts, one of the most useful Colonial commands, because he had ascertained that some members of the corps had been communicating with the Boers.

ROBERTS AND KITCHENER.

LONDON, Feb. 7.—While the suspense regarding Buller's movements and operations affecting the fate of Ladysmith continues unrelieved even by the vaguest despatches, news comes that Lord Roberts and General Kitchener have left for the front.

As this information was held for several hours by the censor it seems to indicate that an important movement is in view.

BOERS ATTACKING GATACRE.

Despatch from Sterkstroom dated this morning announces that the Boers are attacking General Gatacre from two directions. Firing was proceeding between outposts, and a delayed Sterkstroom despatch, dated Feb. 5th, announces that a body of troops left the camp on the 3rd and important developments were expected.

It is quite probable that this ex-

plains Lord Roberts' departure and that the commander-in-chief wishes to be either present at or supervise the long intended movement of Gatacre to join forces with Kelly-Kenny and thus reinforce General French completing the latter's work at Oosburg and establishing without fear of serious opposition an advanced position for the main movement.

BOER BULLETIN.

BOER HEAD LAAGER LADYSMITH, Feb. 6.—Since yesterday the British, with naval and other guns, have bombarded our positions on the Upper Tugela river.

The troops crossed the river at the point and at Molen drift with the object of storming our position.

At the former General Burger beat them back, and they recrossed in disorder.

The fighting continued at Molen drift with the Standerton and Johannesburg commanders.

The cannonade was the fiercest yet experienced. There was continuous roaring all day long.

This morning it recommenced with an increased number of guns.

BULLER ADVANCING.

LONDON, Feb. 7.—The War Office received a telegram today saying that General Buller has recrossed the Tugela river, Feb. 5, and that he is now advancing upon Ladysmith.

Bourassa and Monet Afraid to Speak Debate Collapses
