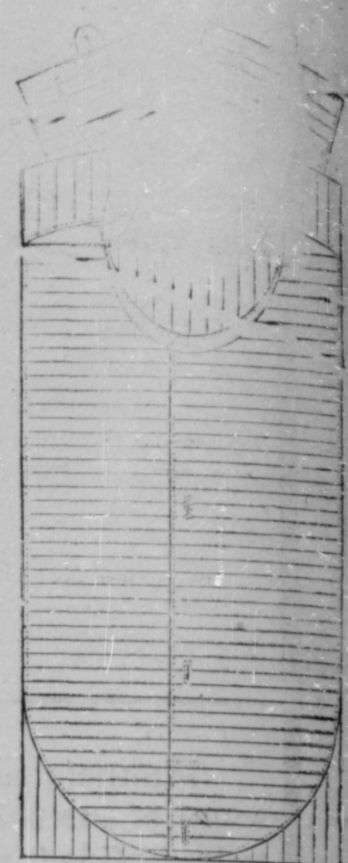

### INCOME TAX.

SIR,—There is a system of collecting income tax going on now by the people called our Local Government which can only find its counterpart and parallel in the dark ages. The Colonial Treasurer, Mr. MacMillan, is a very nice man, and it is in his name that all the scoundrelism of this system is enacted, while the real culprit is the man called Donald Farquharson. The people have no idea of the favoritism that is being practised. A man calls at the tax inquisitorial office. He makes a declaration and the Treasurer is satisfied. Inspector Donald, who delights to

pry into the secrets of every man's business, particularly that of his opponents, causes a second notice to be served on the taxpayer, that the Treasurer does not believe him and demands further proof. If you are a Grit and live in the country, all you have to do is to sign your declaration and forward it to the tax office. The Jurat of the declaration is filled in town without the taxpayer being present at all. This shows what it is to be a Grit—or a Liberal of the New Liberals.
