The warning signal was flashed Saturday night that the unmoored reign of mainland colleges in Maritime Intercollegiate basketball competition would soon be threatened. Maybe not this year, although you can never tell, but possibly next year or the year after.

Judging by the showing that the Saints made against the highly rated St. F. X. quintet, the Saints lost by 17 points but the fact that they outscored the visitors in the last half and that their shooting was definitely off adds up to the answer that the local collegians will be ready to step into senior Intercollegiate ranks this winter.

In the course of a post-game conversation with the Xaverians coach, Ambrose Gilmet, we asked him if his team had a good or bad night. He replied that his boys made a reasonably good showing.

"Pat Connelly and Joe Flaherty were off on their shooting but Howard MacNally, who scored 17 points, was better than at any time last year," he stated. MacNally, who has only been playing for three years, never got more than two or four points last season, he added. Coach Gilmet pointed out that the Saints had given the Xaverians a closer game than had any team in the Maritimes last year when they were on the march to the Maritime Senior and Intercollegiate titles.

Had the Saints not gotten away to such a poor start the game would have been even closer. The slow start was understandable as they were playing against big name competition for the first time. As the game wore on their tenacity appeared to wane and in the last five minutes they were playing the way they operated against the R.C.A.F. a week before. With daily practise under the watchful eye of coach Father MacGuigan and if possible a few more exhibition games with top notch teams, the Saints will make a strong and noisy invasion on Mount A. and U.N.B. this winter.

Tonight "Bud" Poile's Red Raiders from Glance Bay will be at the Forum in a game that will decide sole ownership of second place for the time being. For the past several weeks the Islanders and the Miners have been sticking as close to one another as Johnny Morrow has to his cheek. "Red" Favero, thanks to a pinch hit job by penicillin, is expected to be playing but defenseman Bob Gray and George McLagan will still be on the sidelines.

# Islanders Outplay Halifax St. Mary's For 4-2 Victory

HALIFAX, Nov. 25 (CP)—Halifax St. Mary's completed a disastrous week Saturday night by dropping a 4-2 decision to Charlottetown Islanders. It was the third loss in four games. The other was a tie.

Islanders, sharper up front and stronger on defence, opened out a two-goal lead in the first period then held off the hard driving Saints for the last two frames.

There was another case of Halifax having the chances and being unable to convert them. They fired 11 shots at goalie Hal Gordon in the first period but none scored. They outshot the Islanders in the second but could only split a pair of goals and in the third, Islanders again matched an early Halifax effort.

Saints not only lost the game, but three men through injuries. Two of them, Billy Watson and Hughie Campbell were Saints' top marksmen. Defenceman Fred Weaver was one of the better rearguards on the club.

Campbell has a broken nose, Watson a sprained wrist and Weaver, charged and checked heavily by Johnny Dutchak, suffered torn lateral ligaments that will keep him idle for three to four weeks.

Conny Bonhomme, Buck Whitlock, Walt Pawlyshyn and Sid MacKenzie shared the Island goals while Halifax scorers were Bill Ford and Dennis Smith.

First goal came at 5:01 in the first period when Willie Marshall sent Bonhomme into the clear after Bob Quainville was caught up the ice on a rush. Bonhomme, who played sparkling hockey, sped in on the wing and whipped the puck over Frechette after he went down.

 TORONTO, Nov. 25 (CP)—Ottawa Rough Riders, who didn't figure in pre-season calculations of experts for the Big Four title, tonight stepped up smartly to answer the roll-call as 1951 Canadian football champions and Grey Cup winners.

They took the most-sought-after bauble in the game with a handy 21-24 victory Saturday over Saskatchewan Roughriders, Western Canada titleholders who hadn't played before a Grey Cup crowd in 17 years. It was Saskatchewan's seventh straight loss in East-West competition following a thumping 54-0 defeat by Queen's University in 1923.

For Ottawa, it was its third Grey Cup triumph although one in 1925—was settled in the committee rooms without anybody putting on a uniform.

The game was a fitting climax to this late-autumn madness exhibited annually by football fans from Edmonton to Montreal. It set two records: The crowd of 27,326 was the largest ever to witness a football game in Canada and the gate receipts, about \$131,-

# St. F. X. In 54-37 Win Over Saint Dunstan's

The Senior St. F. X. basketball team on the strength of an 18 point lead in the first half, defeated the St. Dunstan's University senior team 54-37 in an exhibition game at the S. D. U. gymnasium on Saturday night.

The Xaverians, last year's Dominion Intermediate, Maritime Senior and Intercollegiate champions, raced into a 38-16 lead in the first 30 minutes but the Saints came back in the second half to outscore their highly rated opponents 22-21.

The visitors were off and running from the opening whistle and they jumped into an early 10 point lead before the Saints could find the range. After that play remained on a fairly even basis with the Xaverians picking up seven more points than the local collegians.

St. F. X. gave an uncanny display of ball handling with the result that they worked in around the basket for most of their shots. The Saints, on the other hand, were forced to take many of their shots from outside the defence perimeter of the visitors.

The shot-makers on both teams were below form as they missed quite a number of their efforts. Jackie Reardon of the Saints missed several shots that ordinarily would have been duck soup for the rangy youngster.

Howard Mullally, towering St. F. X. centreman, was the leading scorer with 17 points made.
