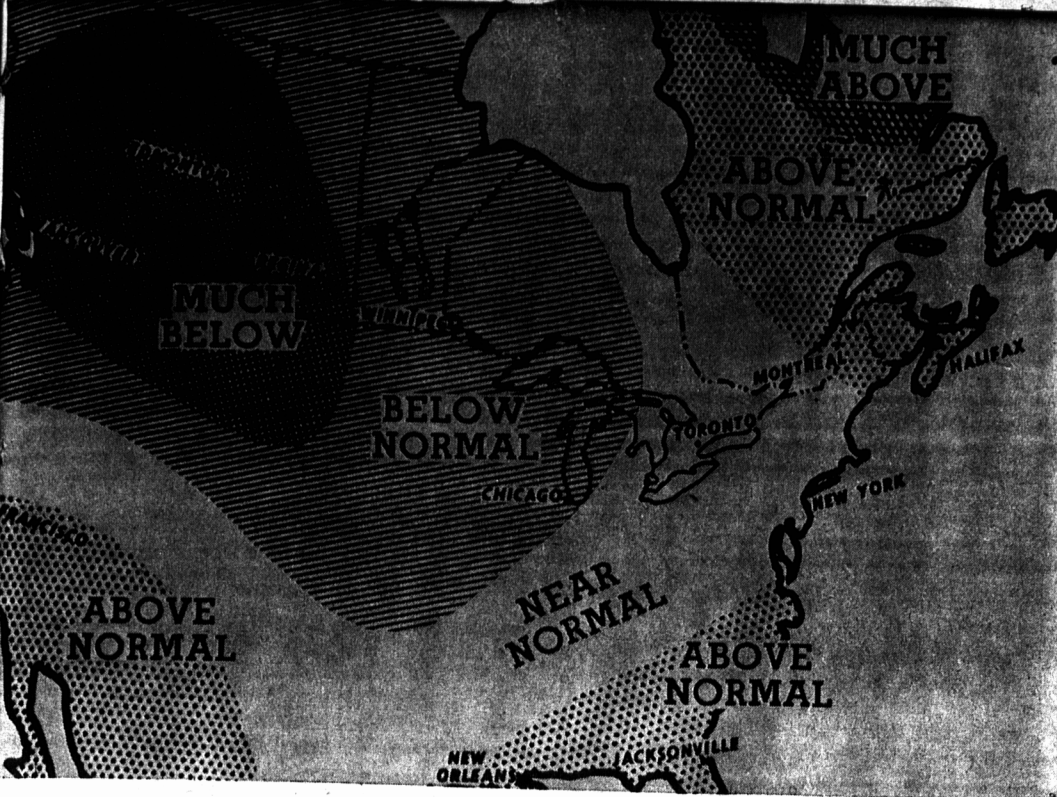

Hundred Million Radar Line Contracts Now Let

OTTAWA (CP)—More than 100,000,000 worth of contracts have been let so far for the Mid-Canada radar line, Defence Minister Campney said Friday night. Total cost of the chain along the 56th parallel is estimated at some \$170,000,000.

Mr. Campney said the big construction project, despite hazards and difficulties, is on schedule. Target date for its completion is secret but the best guess is 1937.

"There is no reason to believe thus far that the line will not be finished on time though, of course, in a project of this type and magnitude, new problems and new construction difficulties may intrude themselves at any time," he added.

JOINT DEFENCE

"Its purpose is for the joint defence of both countries and, indeed, just as much so as anything being done in Europe itself. And that is why Canada and the U.S. have planned and undertaken the project jointly."

Mr. Campney said construction of the two lines in the Arctic and sub-Arctic "will have an impact on the development of the Canadian North commensurate with that which the building of our trans-continental railway lines at the opening up of our Canadian West."

Mr. Campney described the planning that went into the line from the time the first aerial maps were prepared and the tough terrain that has had to be conquered, particularly in the Quebec-Labrador section.

He said officials of the defence and health departments now are discussing the possibility of building several hospitals along the Hudson Bay region of the Mid-Canada line. They would provide services to Eskimo and Indian communities in the area as well as to RCAF personnel manning the line.
