Archbishop Conducts Parish Conference

KENSINGTON — Archbishop S. J. Davies, Diocesan Commissioner of the Diocese of Nova Scotia, was the speaker at the opening session of a parish conference held in St. Mark's Anglican Church Hall Saturday night.

prayer and welcomed Archbishop Davies and his wife, who accompanied him. A film on the Anglican Congress at Toronto in 1963, was shown.

Continuing the conference on Sunday afternoon on the theme, "Let us Look at Ourselves," Archbishop Davies used family life as an illustration of Diocesan life. He said the Diocese is a family consisting of parents, children, older people and sick people.

He compared self supporting parishes to the parents, the church extension parishes to the children, older parishes that now have a lessening population to the older people.

"Just as a Christian family works and lives together, so the Diocese family must work and live together," he said. "Looking beyond our own Diocese," a film strip on the history, life and work of the Diocese of the Yukon was shown. On Sunday evening, following the secular worship at which Archbishop Davies was the preacher, the third and last session was held in St. Mark's Hall.

The theme at this session was "Let us look at the World Church," "The Anglican World Mission," a film on the 1963 Anglican Congress, chiefly perhaps, the call on the people to go forward on the importance of the laity in the church, and the fact that the mission of the church is one of sharing and receiving as well as giving in "mutual unselfed obedience."

The speaker said the most important thing was prayer and prayer call for action. "Summing up the conference, Archbishop Davies said, 'We had to start where we were — let us look at ourselves.' He looked at our Diocese and 'we looked at the world wide mission of the church.' He suggested some kind of study sessions to continue in prayer and learning."
