CATTLE SHIPMENT.—Harmon Humphrey shipped by rail to Halifax for the English market 200 head fat cattle and 200 sheep. The cattle were of a superior quality; Messrs. Buckley Bros. and Capt. Fullerton supplied the sheep; other 200 sheep to go with same lot came from P. E. Island.—Amherst Gazette.

HEARING of excellent quality were caught in some of the rivers of the eastern section of the Island last week. Souris river was swarming with them, some of the nets set taking four and five hundred a night. Cod-fish are reported plentiful off the coast, and many of the fishermen are now laying in a supply for home use for the winter.

THE wreck, J. H. French, lately ashore at Souris, has at last been put afloat. McDonald, McDonald & Co. had the contract of getting her off, and after a hard fight succeeded. She is badly damaged. Three hundred empty barrels, placed in her hold, kept her up. The tug P. C. Bate, started with her in tow from Souris, on Sunday last, for Pictou, where she will be placed on the slip for repairs.

Natural Gas.

PITTSBURG, Oct. 25. Chambers Miller believes natural gas is confined in the earth in a fluid state, and has just filed a caveat for a patent, which is designed to conduct the fluid to the surface into receptacles for its preservation. If this theory should prove correct it will be the greatest discovery of the age. A locomotive for instance with a few gallons of fluid would have a supply of fuel sufficient to run it from Pittsburg to Chicago and an ocean steamer would require only a few barrels to make a trip to Europe. The test of the theory will, in all probability, be made at an early day.
