Household Hints.

Emma's Rhubarb Pie.—Chop fine rhubarb enough for two pies. Add a cupful of sugar, a beaten egg, and a piece of butter half the size of a hen's egg. Bake between two crusts.

Cup Cake.—Two eggs, a cupful of sugar, half a cupful each of sour cream and butter, half a teaspoonful of saleratus, two cupfuls and a half of flour. Some prefer sweet cream, and use cream of tartar.

Buns.—A cupful of sugar, an egg, two-thirds of a cupful of yeast, butter half the size of an egg, and one cupful and a half of milk. Put in butter in the morning. I omit the egg sometimes, and like it quite as well.

Tray Pudding.—A cupful of molasses, half a cupful of sugar, half a cupful of sour milk, half a cupful of water, a teaspoonful of soda, a teaspoonful of salt, and three cupfuls of flour, steam two or three hours, and serve with cream or other sauce.

Seed Cakes.—Two cupfuls of sugar, a cupful of butter, a little more than a cupful of milk, a heaping teaspoonful of cream of tartar, and a small teaspoonful of saleratus; caraway seed to taste.

Cider Cake.—A cupful of butter, a cupful of cream, a cupful of cider, three cupfuls of sugar, four eggs, and five cupfuls of flour, spice with cloves and nutmeg; a few chopped raisins make it nice.

Fruit Cake.—Six cupfuls of flour, three cupfuls of brown sugar, six eggs, half a cupful of sweet milk, half a cupful of molasses, a cupful and a half of butter, and a teaspoonful of soda; fruit and spice to taste.

Molasses Drop Cakes.—A cupful of molasses, half a cupful of melted butter or lard, half a cupful of water, three cupfuls of flour, a teaspoonful of ginger, and a small teaspoonful of soda. Beat well and drop on buttered tins, and bake quickly.

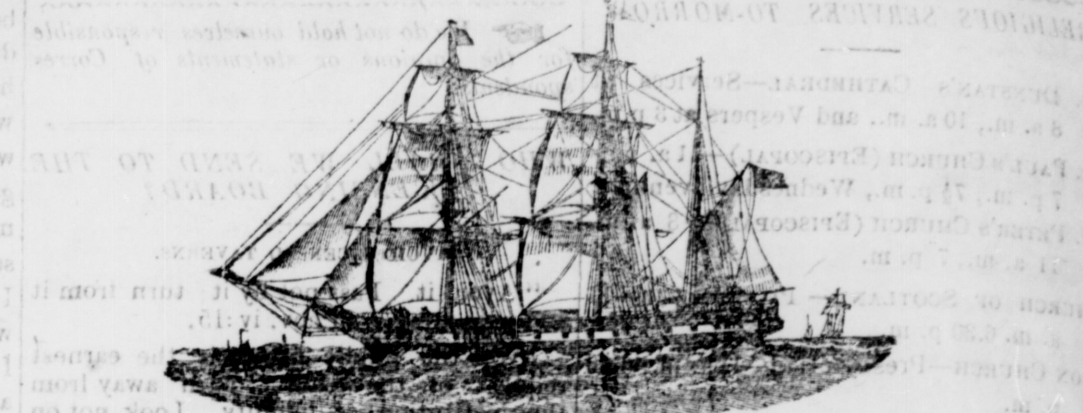
