Firing from the 200, 500 and 600 yard ranges, Capt. Roy McCabe of Charlottesville registered an aggregate total of 104 out of a possible 105 points to lead the field in the prize shoot contest Saturday at Squaw Point range by the Provincial Rifle Association.

To put together his total Capt. McCabe scored 34 out of 35 at 200 yards, dropping the one point on his second shot. Going back to the 500 and 600 y a r d firing points, he proceeded to register two perfect 35's.

WBA Seeks Elimination

NORFOLK, Va. (AP)—The World Boxing Association threw up another blockade Saturday in a move to solidify its ban on the proposed Cassius Clay — Sonny Liston heavyweight championship bout.

Closing its 46th annual convention here, the WBA voted unanimously to declare the heavyweight title vacant and expand all principals involved immediately on announcement by the promoters of the date and site of the proposed rematch.

If this happens, retiring president Ed Lassman of Miami Beach, Fla., said, the WBA would recommend an elimination series of bouts among the top contenders to decide the new champion.

The WBA refused Friday to sanction the fight because of 99 violation of the return bout clause. Inter-Continental Promotions announced it would stage the fight anyway, proba-

bly in November and at a site to be determined.

BOUT NOT WANTED

New York and California, two of the WBA, have announced they do not want the Clay-Liston bout.

The latest rankings for the heavyweight division were released Saturday and Liston was again not listed. Ernie Terrell of Chicago moved up as No. 1 challenger to Clay.

Nichols Edges Arnie To Win World Title

BIRMINGHAM, Mich. (AP)—Young Bobby Nichols' nerves held like strands of steel in the face of a fierce charge by Arnold Palmer Sunday and the 26-year-old PGA clubhouse won the \$35,000 first prize with a two-under-par 73 in the first World Open golf championship. Palmer, the game's most

dreaded finisher, collared Nichols with a spectacular eagle on the 12th hole and then, after falling two shots back, hit the pin with his approach from the fairway on the 459-yard, uphill 18th, bringing the tournament to a dramatic climax.

The ball bounded about 10 feet beyond the cup. White thousands watched in hushed

silence, the hero of Arnie's Army banged the ball home for a birdie three, closing 71 and becoming the first to win the title in Columbus, but down the stretch he was cool as ice and straight as a rifle shot with almost every club.

Undaunted by the roars ahead of him, the poised Nichols, playing in the final threesome just back of Palmer, boomed his drive down the middle of the fairway, laced his approach to the far part of the green, 30 feet from the pin, and two-

COOL IN STRETCH

This gave him a final round 72. He scrambled during the early holes, just as he did in winning the PGA title last month in Columbus, but down the stretch he was cool as ice and straight as a rifle shot with almost every club.

South Africa's Gary Player rallied with a final round 70 for a total of 281 and \$50,000 third money, but the loudest cheer were reserved for the magnificent Betsy Hogan, the once dreaded player of another era.

73 great Hogan, now a slow walking, semi-retired 52, returned to Oakland Hills, scene of one of his greatest triumphs, and finished with a brilliant two-under-par 68 for 282.

This placed him in a tie for fourth place with Pete Brown, a burly Negro from Los Angeles, who closed with a 69 to become the first of his race to finish so high in such an important tournament.

BOONTS EARNINGS

The big bonanza boosted Nichols' earnings for the year to \$72,007.26 and raised him to the top five in the year's money winning list.

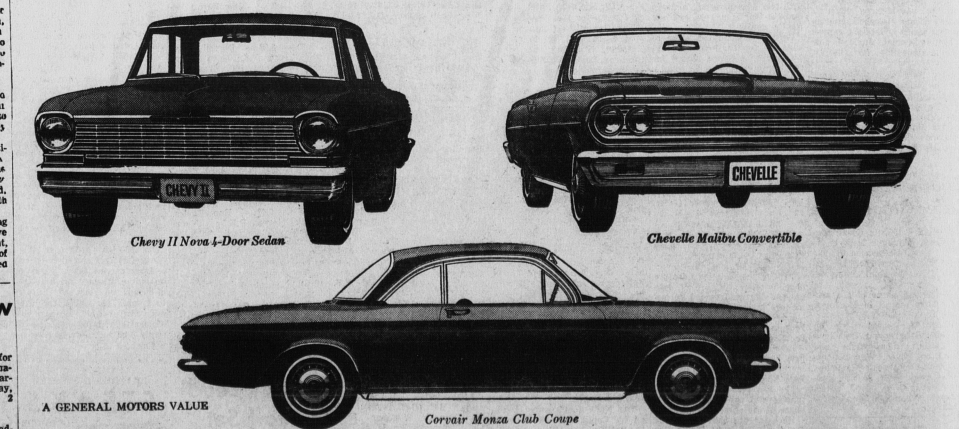
Palmer, who must be cultivating a runner-up complex, got some consolation from his bid for his \$17,000 second prize when he hit the money lead, past rival Jack Nicklaus, with \$107,745.37.

The powerful, long-hitting Nicklaus never got his mass attack going in this tournament, failing to break par in any of his four rounds. He finished with a 71 for 286.

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
