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IDA BAILEY ALLEN Rich Bavarian Cream Differs From Mousse. "What is the difference between a frozen sweet mousse and a Bavarian cream?" is a question often asked when the Chef and I make a public appearance. The Answer: Both desserts are made with similar ingredients. If both contain whipped cream, folded into a cooked sweet egg thickened base. If it is a mousse, it is frozen; if a Bavarian, it is solidified with gelatin.

Covered And Frozen. If it is a Bavarian cream, unfavored gelatin is added to the cooked base. If it is a mousse, it is frozen; if a Bavarian, it is solidified with gelatin.

Measurements are level PINEAPPLE BAVARIAN (A Make-Ahead Dessert) 1 (1lb. 4oz.) can pineapple tidbits 1/2 cup water (about) 1 envelope unfavored gelatin 1/4 cup salt 1/2 c. sugar 2 eggs 1 c. heavy cream, whipped 2 tsp. vanilla Drain pineapple, reserve syrup. Add water to make 1 c. Liquid Combine gelatin, salt and 2 tsp. sugar. Stir in 1/2 c. water. Heat - stir until gelatin dissolves.

Separate eggs: beat yolks; beat in hot liquid. Cook - stir 2 or 3 min. Chill. Beat egg whites to soft peaks. Beat in remaining sugar until stiff peaks form. Beat cream until stiff. When gelatin begins to thicken, fold in egg whites, cream, vanilla and
