ST. ANDREWS, (CP)—A CCF cabinet minister from Saskatchewan calls it a pooling of brains and experience. His New Brunswick Progressive conservative counterpart feels sure it will have beneficial results for all Canada.

The representative of the Nova Scotia Liberal cabinet says it shows the interest of the 10 provinces don't necessarily conflict.

The three members of three provincial governments and three political faiths were talking about the Trade and Industry Council conference now in session here. They typify how party politics are forgotten when provincial government spokesmen from British Columbia to Newfoundland sit down together to promote the economic development of Canada.

Keynote of the conference is a recognition that no one province can be fully prosperous unless all provinces are prosperous.

"When a number of people try to do the same job, they are all going to have different success and all are likely to make different mistakes," says Hon. J.H. Brockbank, Saskatchewan minister of natural resources and industrial development.

"At this conference, we learn from each other's accomplishments and errors. While it is true we have different political beliefs, the Progressive Conservative government in New Brunswick is just as Canadian a government as the CCF in Saskatchewan. The provinces have problems common to Canada and can help each other. For example, it is generally recognized by the Ontario delegates that to have a prosperous Ontario, there must be a prosperous Canada."

Hon. J.R. Pichette, N.B. minister of industry and development, saw a brighter economic future rising from the council's deliberations.

"I feel quite confident that something good can come out of the conference, something good for each province and Canada," he said. "In New Brunswick, we hope to have higher employment through industrial development."

Hon. W.T. Dauphinee, Nova Scotia minister of trade and industry, looked at the four-day meeting this way: "Delegates discuss ways and means of promoting industrial development. Information and statistics are ex-

changed inter-provincially, as well as between the provinces and the federal government. The basic concept of the conference seems to me to be that the interests of the various provinces don't necessarily conflict."

Polish Bishop, Three Priests Get Prison Terms

WARSAW, (AP)—A Polish military court Monday sentenced Most Rev. Czeslaw Kaczmarek, bishop of Kielce, and three other Roman Catholic priests to prison terms ranging up to 12 years on charges of spying for the Vatican and the United States.

Sister Waleria Niklewska, a nun similarly accused by Poland's Communist government, received a five-year sentence that was immediately suspended. She was released.

All had pleaded guilty. Bishop Kaczmarek set the keynote Monday with a statement, a part of his public confession, that he had been fighting Communism since the Russian revolution of 1918. The bishop drew a 12-year term.

The court sentenced Rev. Jan Daleszewski, former treasurer of the Kielce Curia, to 10 years; Rev. Josef Dabrowski, former chaplain to the bishop, to nine years; and Rev. Wladyslaw Widlak, a former official of the Kielce seminary, to six years.

The trial, widely publicized by the Warsaw radio, followed the pattern of many others behind the Iron Curtain in which churchmen have been condemned. The Vatican denounced the case from the start.

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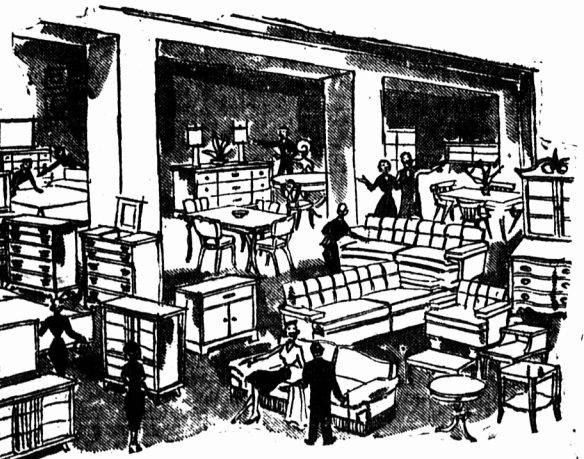
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
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
