SECOND READING — Given second reading in the Legislature yesterday was a bill to amend the act of Incorporation of the Town of Summerside.

The mover of the bill, Mr. Morley Bell explained that the first part of the bill was seeking legislation to allow the Town to issue debentures to the extent of \$475,000. This amount, he said, was to be used for the purpose of paying for a new school now under construction which will be completed before the end of the summer.

The second part of the bill asked for permission to tax employed females earning a certain amount of money during the year.

Fire Closes Medical Centre And Damages Other Premises

Dense smoke and a shortage of respirators hampered Summerside firemen in their efforts to locate a stubborn fire in the east wall of the Medical Centre after they responded to a call about 10:15 last night.

The fire originated from a refrigerator in the dispensary of Enmans Drug Store, Water St. West, and climbed up the wall to the office of Dr. J.C. Simpson, located immediately above.

Considerable damage resulted to the wall and ceiling of the dispensary and to the wall and floor of

A slope; and then there is present day equipment that can be used to take care of such things.

When the causeway was built at Cape Sable Island there was great concern in respect to fisheries. Information which we have is that the fishing in that area was greatly improved since the causeway was built there.

COMPARE COSTS

"Suppose we go into the cost now to the Federal Government. The cartage operating cost, as I said, is a million and a half dollars for the Canadian Government, and that rising on the same scale would be up to over two million in 1962, the earliest date in which this causeway could be built. The total cost, including depreciation, say by the year 1962, (this you may say differs slightly from the figure I gave you a few moments ago, and it does, because it was made by another engineer) would be two and a half million dollars. The other one I said would be about three or slightly over. The cost of maintenance of the causeway would be negligible and it should result in a saving to the Federal Government, without any tolls whatsoever on it, of over a million dollars a year at present day travel.

"Now I am convinced in my own mind, with the work we have done so far, that a causeway more feasible than a tunnel. There are those who say you cannot build a causeway in that area because of mud and because of the bottom. Let me point out to you that they do it in Holland and have done it for years. The Leader of the Opposition mentioned a causeway in Holland, I think he said 25 miles; I believe the one he was referring to was 20 miles really, they have a rock bottom in that country and they don't worry about it. They build on sand and when they are asked the depth of the sand they say they don't know and they don't care. These causeways have held up under all conditions. The only time they were broken, I think, was during the last war when they were bombed by the A.F. 4.

AS FOR A TUNNEL

"Let us go to the question of the tunnel. This was advocated in 1890. At that time it was a one tube tunnel from Cape Traverse to Cape Tormentine, electrified trains, with a maximum diameter of 13 feet. There would be nine and a half miles from portal to portal. The bottom of the tunnel would be 155 feet below the high tide level of the water in the Strait, and the material would be through the red clay shale. A tunnel might have been considered adequate at that time and in that day for our transportation needs, but since the automobile has replaced the Railway as a means of transportation you would need a tunnel that would combine railway with the other traffic, and 31 or 32 feet I think in the Lincoln and Holland Tunnels are the minimum requirements, and then you would have a situation similar to what we have here at the Hillsboro Bridge.

"There has since been another built and will be opened this year; the diameter of each is 31 feet and the cost, completed, seventy-five million dollars. The total cost of our tunnel on the same basis would be about one hundred and seventy million dollars. The cost at today's prices could well be considerably over that. A tunnel nine miles long would proportionately be costlier than a one-mile tunnel because the haul and removing of materials delivered under compressed air and other materials over a greater distance would cost more. Now, what about the problem when you did have it built? The greater portion of the tunnel would have to be ventilated and automobiles and diesel with their gas making driving very hazardous and quite foggy. We know
