# Diocesan Federation, Catholic Men Formed

Dr. J. H. O'Hanley, Charlottetown, was elected first president of the newly-established Diocesan Federation of Catholic Men at its first meeting of its Board of Directors last night. Also elected to the executive committee of the organization were Joseph Gaudin, Yonks Road, vice-president; J. E. Green, Charlottetown, secretary; Dr. Leo Killom, Charlottetown, treasurer; and Eugene MacDonald, member at large. Chaplain of the new organization is Rev. Vincent Murnaghan, director of the St. Dunstan's University extension department. Additional members are to be named to the executive committee at a later date.

According to a spokesman, the new diocesan organization is a federation of 35 parish associations of Catholic men which have been in the process of formation for several years, and which for the most part were formally established in their parishes during the past several months. A diocesan conference of representative laymen from the member parishes held in September resulted in the election of a board of directors of 18 persons, from whom the members were elected last evening.

The diocesan federation is reported to be primarily a service organization established to assist the parish associations in achieving their aims. These are compressed in a general statement of purpose contained in their common constitution, as being "to assist the Catholic laymen fulfill their duty to God, self, and neighbor through a practical realization of the lay apostolate."

At their meeting, the board of directors also considered ways in which the diocesan federation may best assist the member organizations, as well as common problems relating to programming and administration of the federation itself.

Dr. O'Hanley, president of St. Peter's Bay, P.E.I. He graduated from St. Dunstan's University in 1942 with a BA degree. He joined the Canadian Army following graduation, and served overseas during the Second World War as a lieutenant in a paratroop battalion. Following his discharge from the army in 1945, Dr. O'Hanley returned to St. Dunstan's where he received a B.Sc. degree in 1946. He then entered the McGill School of Medicine, graduating with a degree in medicine in 1950. In 1955, following post-graduate studies in pediatrics, Dr. O'Hanley received his Certificate in Pediatrics from the Royal Canadian College of Physicians and Surgeons.

# Interim-Pastor For Baptist Church To Begin Ministry

Rev. Carl V. Farmer, BA, of Toronto, and Mrs. Farmer arrived in Charlottetown Thursday when Mr. Farmer, on Sunday, begins his ministry as interim-pastor.

Mr. Farmer was born in Toronto, the youngest son of Professor Jones Hughes Farmer, BA, LL.D., who was for many years dean of theology at McMaster University. Mr. Farmer, after graduating from McMaster and from Osgoode Hall Law School, was called to the bar and practiced law for some time.

Since being called and ordained as a minister of the gospel, and after a period of service in Montreal, he became pastor of the Castlefield Avenue Church (now Blythwood Road) and later of Dufferin Street Baptist Church, Toronto. He has served as interim minister at Farmer Memorial, which church was named in memory of his father, also, Danforth Avenue, Toronto; at the Broadway First Baptist Church in Winnipeg; at Bethel Church, and for the past three years, was chairman of the National Religious Advisory Council of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation.

Mr. Farmer comes to the First Baptist Church here at a time when interest is high and there is great activity. The congregation is in the final stage of an intensive "Onward in Faith" campaign aimed at maintaining and increasing interest. In all phases of the church's program, and reports indicate that this effort is meeting with complete success. A "victory service" in this connection is scheduled for Sunday evening.

Mr. Farmer will be with the First Baptist Church as interim-pastor until March 1, when the pastor-elect, Rev. Malcolm Harlow of Calgary, Alta., will take up his duties.

Mr. and Mrs. Farmer are occupying the new parsonage erected on Ambrose Street about a year ago.
