

"Drama" in concert

The Halifax-based recording group DRAMA headlines the first in a series Schooner Music Concert/Dances to tour Atlantic universities and colleges. Five-piece high-energy rockers, DRAMA performs current edge rock as well as material from its forthcoming EP.

Led by vocalist Peter Ettinger, DRAMA first made its mark when it won the Labatt's Blue Live Battle of the Bands contest in Saint John, N.B. in 1986. Since then, DRAMA has played more than half its dates in Quebec and the Ottawa Valley and the group holds attendance records in several of that region's major rock clubs. After an extensive tour there this Spring,

DRAMA returned to Halifax in June to record its first EP.

Produced and engineered by Vancouver's Rolf Henneman (who has worked with such artists as Heart, Chilliwack, Al Stewart, Randy Meisner, John Baldry and Veronique Beliveau), the sessions were mixed at Mushroom Studios over the Summer. After a few weeks playing at home, DRAMA returned to Quebec and to work on packaging for the album. The group recently completed photo sessions for the EP and promotional material with top Montreal fashion photographer Stephane Dumais. The self-titled debut EP is expected to be in record stores throughout Atlantic

Canada in the second week of October.

Opening for DRAMA is a brand-new five-piece group from Dartmouth called SWEET SURRENDER. Formed from the nucleus of Chyna Whyte,

a group that began in high school playing talent shows and non-licensed bars, the trio added a new lead vocalist and a guitarist/keyboard player to create a band that concentrates on current edge-rock

and 70s material and originals.

The band comes to UPEI's Barn on Thursday, October 1 at 9:00 pm. All seats are \$6.00 and tickets are on sale now at the SU office.

Rocketship piggy banks for scholarships

ST. JOHN'S (CUP) - students at Newfoundland's only university will be asked to finance their own scholarships by plunking pennies into a giant piggy bank.

And Memorial University's (MUN) student council is challenging post-secondary institutions across the country to follow suit.

The students will place a huge piggy bank in a cafeteria during National Universities Week, scheduled between October 24 and November 1. The money raised will be doled out through MUN's Scholarships and Awards Committee.

"We hope that because the students are contributing to themselves, they will be freely of their funds. We welcome any contributions, be it \$1 or \$50," said Marie Vaughan, council president.

Vaughan hopes other universities will pick up the idea, and compete in a "Generosity per Capita" contest. She co-chairs a Canadian Federation of Students Commission which is seeking ways to involve students in the awareness-raising week.

MUN's theme will relate to the future, Vaughan said, and she's looking for a rocketship design for the bank.

"We thought we should get involved in the 'investing in our own future' concept," said Vaughan.

No other universities have, as yet, responded to the challenge, according to Mary Elizabeth Archer, MUN's coordinator for National Universities Week activities.
