Supreme Court.

JUNE 27. The petit jury list was called over at ten o'clock this morning and the trial of the civil list commenced before the Chief Justice.

The first case called was Kenneth J. Martin, administrator of the late Donald C. Martin, against John J. Davies, an action to recover some cases of stuffed birds which the plaintiff claims belonged to the late Donald C. Martin. The trial is still in progress. McLean for plaintiff; Peters and Warburton for defendant.

The Grand Jury were discharged last evening after having found a Bill of Indictment against Lanchin Black for stealing from a mail bag between North Wiltshire Station and Darnley Post Office; also a bill against a man named Logan charged with obtaining money under false pretences.

Brazil's New Constitution.

The new constitution of Brazil has been promulgated. It recognizes a federal system based on that of the United States. The President alone is responsible to the nation. The ministers are replaced by Secretaries of State who are answerable to the President alone. Parliament will consist of a house of Representatives and a senate. The powers of these two bodies will be of a purely legislative character, and an adverse vote by either chamber will not entail a change of ministry. A new House of Representatives will be elected triennially and a new Senate every nine years. The president's term of office will be six years. The first presidential election will be by congress and has been fixed for November next. The new constitution is a source of much relief to the people, as it gives them more confidence in the Government than when under dictatorial control. There is great rejoicing throughout Brazil.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, June 26. It is reported that dissatisfied Heligolanders want imperial authorities to pay their passages to America rather than compel them to submit to German rule. Today the Minister of Agriculture wired the High Commissioner to urge Canada as a desirable home for these people in the event of their wishing to leave Heligoland.

People are puzzled at the vigorous assertions in certain quarters that General Middleton is to resign, and Middleton's no less vigorous denials. It may be taken as a positive fact that Middleton will resign before many days.

A big firm of cigar dealers are in trouble in Toronto for affixing Customs stamps over Inland Revenue stamps with the intention to deceive the public as to the character of the brand of cigars.

Bernier, a Montreal contractor, has been awarded \$60,000 extra on the Welland Canal. His claim was for a quarter of a million.

A sub-committee of Council consisting of Hon. Messrs. Tupper, Dewdney, Haggart and Colby leave this week for Nova Scotia to inspect the Oxford, New Glasgow, and Cape Breton Railways. They will likely visit Halifax. C. C. Chipman accompanies them as secretary.

Gen. Middleton's Resignation.

TORONTO, June 26. A special cable to the Globe to-day from London speaks of General Middleton's resignation as an accomplished fact. In regard to this the General said this morning: "I have not sent in my resignation. They have nothing to do with it over in England anyway. I have not seen what is published from there to-day, but I am sick of Canadian newspapers."

Governor McLellan Dead.

HALIFAX, June 26. Governor McLellan died at 11 o'clock this forenoon. He has been ailing for a year or more. During the past week he was confined to his room, suffering from heart disease. His remains will be taken to Londonderry, his native place. The funeral will take place on Saturday.

Placing the Blame.

LIVERPOOL, June 26. The Board of Trade to-day, in the matter of the accident to the Anchor Line steamer City of Rome, which ran on Fastnet Rock, during a fog, has found the accident due to the failure of Capt. Young to attend to the warnings of the lead.

He Still Lives.

MONTREAL, June 26. All newspapers in the county, including the local sheets in Sorel, fell into a gross error in announcing the death of Mr. Masson, M. P. for Richelieu, who still lives, though very low.

Cornell Wins.

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 26. The boat race between Cornell and the University of Pennsylvania crews was won by the Cornell by six lengths, in 14.43, over a three-mile course.

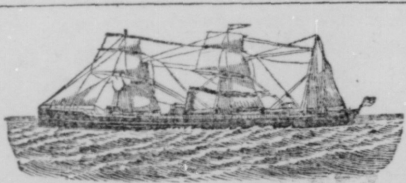
