New Processing Plant Operating At Pisquid

Strawberry growers in the Pisquid area have a new and modern processing plant which has just been completed, that is expected to add greatly to the efficiency of the marketing of the crop produced in the district.

Milton Rodgerson told this paper the building runs more than 100 feet in length and is 24 feet wide. The old building, the former Clark Brothers warehouse was 40 feet long and the new one runs to 90 feet, he said.

The plant can handle 40,000 boxes a day which is expected to be the biggest single day's harvest. Mr. Rodgerson explained. It has a cooling room with a refrigeration unit, where the berries can be held until they can be hauled by the new hauling unit installed.

The plant will be supplied by 35 growers, largest of which is Plus MacDonald with 10 to 12 acres.
