U. N. Commission Limits Authority Of South Korean Regime

By George Bria LAKE SUCCESS, Oct. 12 (AP) - The United Nations Commission on Korea today limited the authority of the Syngman Rhee government to South Korea and empowered Gen. Douglas MacArthur to set up United Nations civil rule in North Korea.

The Commission unanimously approved at closed meeting an Australian proposal to exclude the Rhee regime from areas beyond the 38th parallel until country-wide elections can be held. This will have the effect of putting Rhee before the Korean voters again.

The Commission promptly called its decision to Gen. MacArthur, thus giving him the go-ahead to establish civil rule in the liberated northern areas.

Under the Australian proposal, officers representing various national armies fighting under the U.N. colors will be associated with the civil administration.

Informed circles said the main purpose of the Australian proposal is to preserve freedom of action for the Commission in Northern Korea until the elections are held. The seven-member Commission will start operating in Korea as soon as the military situation permits.

The Commission's action came as the Russians delayed U.N. economic and Social Council debate on Korean relief and rehabilitation by a surprise attempt to seat Communist China.

Burning Spanish Ship Sinks At Dock

HALIFAX, Oct. 12 (CP) - The coal-burning Spanish freighter *Incorta*, badly damaged by flames, lay on the harbor bottom beside a Halifax pier tonight after a hectic day of fire-fighting.

The *Incorta* made Halifax yesterday under her own power after a three-day dash with flames smouldering in her holds. After longshoremen opened her hatches the fire burst out anew and ravaged the 3,500-ton ship. Damage was estimated by one official at \$800,000.

As the blaze took over, two fireboats and the city fire department poured thousands of tons of water into the stricken ship. Early in the morning, a smashing pier superstructure against the pier, and settled on the bottom, with more than half her deck awash.

HALIFAX, Oct. 12 (CP) - The liner *Batory*, most scrutinized ship to enter North American ports, sailed for Southampton tonight after taking 220 passengers aboard here.
