Diefenbakers Facing Bus Schedule Thurs.

Prime Minister Diefenbaker faces a busy schedule here on Thursday, when he flies in from Stouffville to Summerside at 10 a.m. for a P.E.I. appearance that will last until 11:30 that night, it was learned yesterday from party headquarters in Charlottetown.

Mr. Diefenbaker, who will be accompanied by Mrs. Diefenbaker, speaks at the Capital Theatre, Summerside at 10:30 a.m. Mr. Pritchard, candidate G. Lorne Monkley, and other party personalities on the platform.

The Diefenbakers leave by air for Charlottetown where they will arrive at 12:15 in time for luncheon and a short break, before leaving for Morell two hours later. The party is due to arrive at Morell at 2 p.m. and the speech on behalf of Kings PC candidates Margaret Macdonald will be at a meeting that starts at 3:30.

The party's national leader and his wife are due to leave Morell at 4:15, and are expected to arrive at Charlottetown in time for dinner and a brief rest before appearing at Birchwood high school at 7:30 for the big meeting of the campaign here at 8:30, where he will appear with Queens candidates, Finance Minister Angus Maclean and Health Macquarrie, Premier Walter E. Shaw, and other leading PC figures.

Three hours later, the Diefenbakers will be escorted to the Charlottetown airport from where they will appear for Moncton, and further appearances along the arduous campaign trail to which top national political figures are subjected at election time.

Party campaign organizers are hoping for fine weather by the time their national leader appears, and most agreed that yesterday's storm, which has hampered traffic almost completely in the province, will have blown itself out by that time.
