HAND BALL MATCH.—The last of the series of hand ball games between Messrs. Gauthier and Blaquiere vs. Messrs. Campbell and Arsenault took place at St. Dunstan's College yesterday afternoon under the same management as the game previously reported. The match was very interesting, and the most intense excitement prevailed among the students during the eighteen minutes that the game lasted. The strong rays of the mid day sun softened the rubber ball, thus increasing its elasticity and causing it to rebound with greater sprightliness. Indeed in seemed to have life as it bounced about the alley, now curving round the corners, then striking the walls at an angle, rebounding to the floor and falling in such an uncertain locality as tested the judgment of the players to the utmost extent. The game was hotly contested throughout, and at first fortune seemed to favor Messrs. Gauthier and Blaquiere, who at the end of the third round had secured three points to their opponents one. During the fourth and fifth rounds excellent skill and judgment in meeting the ball were exhibited by all the players, and Messrs. Campbell and Arsenault increased their number of points to five, while their opponents added only one score. Honors were more evenly divided now, and the chances of success seemed about equal for both contending parties. But in the beginning of the sixth round Messrs. Gauthier and Blaquiere lost their self-possession, and repeatedly missed the ball, thus permitting their opponents to add three more scores to their number. Shortly afterwards they regained confidence in themselves, and before the sixth round ended the game stood even at eight to eight. Messrs. Campbell and Arsenault had now the ball in possession, and that they would score another point before their "hands" were put out was almost a foregone conclusion among the spectators. And so it happened; they made the expected score, and won the victory.

INTERESTING NEWS NOTES SELECTED FOR THE EXAMINER.

In the Griswold district of Manitoba, seeding has commenced.

The water in the Mississippi delta is receding slowly. Reports received from the overflowed country are most encouraging.

While a mass was being said in a church near Castres, France, in department of Tarn, the roof collapsed. Seven women and one man were killed and 30 persons were seriously injured.

Peck's Spaw, the Milwaukee funny paper, is dead. It once had 80,000 circulation and was founded by George W. Peck, who became Governor of Wisconsin through the popularity of his paper. The Spaw's circulation began to go down from 80,000 to 60,000, from 60,000 to 40,000, from 40,000 to 20,000, from 20,000 to 5,000 and from 5,000 to 3,000, when it died.

According to mail advices by the steamer Empress of Japan, a severe earthquake occurred at Girau, Formosa, recently. About 300 houses were toppled over and 200 persons were killed or badly injured. The mortality from earthquakes is said to be increasing alarmingly of late in Formosa, and an order will be issued for only earthquake-proof houses to be erected within certain limits.

The Argus, of Cape Town, announced a few days ago that it had received trustworthy information from the capital of the Transvaal that the British have secured Invack Island, at the entrance of Delagoa Bay, and that a squadron of warships will proceed there to take possession of the island and proclaim it British territory.

Robert Fitzsimmons, in the presence of 5,000 people at Chicago, made the formal announcement that he resigned the title of champion of the world, and was willing that anyone else should have it. He did not care for it and would not fight for it, and it did not interest him who assumed it.
